Fresh Look Offers Improved Facilities & Program Flexibility

Ribbon-Cutting Ceremony Sept. 20th

The formal dedication of the \$10,770,000 capital improvement project is scheduled to take place on Sunday, September 20th at 2:00 PM in the multipurpose gymnasium. The project was developed as part of the District's Strategic Planning process that was adopted by the Board of Education in 2009. With a 75% voter approval rate, the project was approved in March 2013 with onsite work getting under way in the fall of 2014. In January 2014, voters approved an additional \$925,000 to cover replacement of over 50,000 square feet of roof plus some additional work on the stage and a new south vestibule.

The project has involved the construction of a new gym, stage/large group instruction room, locker rooms, band and chorus rooms, and a remodeled weight/ fitness room. Drainage around the elementary wing, air exchange and circulation in the lower level of the elementary building, and a new south entrance have also been addressed. Ten classrooms in the original 1960 section of the school received new ceilings, lighting and painting. All of the hallways received new wall tile, lighting and ceiling finishes.

The fresh look, new finishes, improved facilities and space offer the district a great deal more flexibility for programming, instruction and events. The combination gym/performing arts center will provide our students with a greatly enlarged gym and state-of-the-art stage and theatrical facility for productions, concerts and shows. The new Fitness Room will be equipped with over \$100,000 worth of the latest equipment that will be available to our student's every day.

The dedication ceremony will include performances by the high school band and high school chorus. There will also be comments from the Senior Class President, Lindsay Robinson; Ellicottville



Central School Board President, Carl Calarco; and Superintendent, Mark J. Ward. Personal tours will be conducted and light refreshments will be served at the conclusion of the ceremony.

We want to take this opportunity to thank SEI (our Architects and Engineers) for the fabulous design they have given us. We also want to thank Campus Construction (our Construction Manager) for making sure the District project followed the plans that were designed. Lastly, SLR, our General Contractors did a great job pulling all parts of the project together in a timely and professional manner.

For those of us who work in the building, it has been exciting to watch the project develop over the past eighteen months. Some parts of this project have been a goal that dates back nearly thirty years, maybe longer. Having a performing arts facility where students can experience a true theatrical setting and performance environment has long been a dream for our school. Students, parents and community members... you are going to be very surprised with the changes and improvements you will see! We encourage you to circle September 20th on your calendar and join us for the "official" ribbon cutting ceremony.

What's New? ... Where Do We Begin!

Without question, this year will bring the most change to our District we have seen since the elementary wing was opened in 1988 or the original "new school" was opened in 1961! The physical changes to the existing building, enlarged spaces and the new addition have transformed our campus dramatically. The pictures in the newsletter tell part of the story, but you will have to walk the halls and visit the new facilities to get to true impact of the "changes."

The look is brighter, the colors are pleasing, the spaces are redefined, and the gym and stage area are almost breath taking! No words can capture the transformation that has taken place. Thanks to the support and confidence of our community, this project is a reality. What started initially in planning that took place in the mid-1980's and was re-ignited in 2009 has now become a reality.

The project will change almost everything that happens in school. It will impact instruction, physical education, band, chorus, performances, interscholastic sports, student fitness, production experiences, concerts, air quality, graduation and a variety of health and safety issues. This school year will be full of "surprises" as we learn more about our new facilities and how they impact our daily routine.

Other changes that will also impact the new school year are listed below:

- Four new teachers have been added to our professional teaching staff (2 elementary, business, & special education)
- Three long term substitutes will be covering for Mrs. Weber, Mrs. Peters and Mrs. Keller
- The District has added six new Teacher Aides (4 full-time, 2 part-time) and one Teacher Assistant
- We will once again have two AmeriCorps workers

- Plan to hire a new cleaner and .5 maintenance/.5 cleaner
- Two new leased buses have been added to our fleet
- Elementary computer lab computers have been replaced with 25 Mac-Minis
- Fourteen desktop computers for the technology lab have been replaced
- Over 50 tablet computers will be available to students and staff in the Distance Learning Computer Lab, on carts and in classrooms
- We have purchased 92 additional Dell laptops to go with the 53 we bought in June, so we can distribute laptops to all students in grades 10-12
- District employees completed the remodeling of two class room spaces
- Normal housekeeping and cleaning of all classrooms has been completed
- West Valley students will now be participating on all ECS interscholastic sports teams
- ECS will be adding a new college course in our science curriculum...Mr. Glenn Hall will be offering a Global Environment course for college credit through SUNY College of Environmental Science and Forestry
- With the decision to bring back the Business curriculum we are excited to be able to offer the following JCC courses for college credit this year: Accounting, Introduction to Business, Web Publishing and Personal Finance

As you can see there are a lot of changes and improvements that the new school year will bring. No matter how long you have been in the "education business," the excitement of a new year is something that never gets "old!" The "ECS Educational Team" looks forward to the challenges and opportunities 2015-16.

Ellicottville Elementary Named 2015-2016 Reward School

NYS Commissioner MaryEllen Elia has identified Ellicottville as one of 365 high achieving and high progress schools in New York State (only 198 are outside of NYC!). In order to attain this distinction, "ECS Elementary School has demonstrated educational excellence through an increase in student achievement and closing the gap in student performance." This has been done through the highest achievement in the State with no significant gaps in student achievement.

The Middle School/High School received this distinction in 2013-14.

Bus Safety Rules & Regulations

"DON'T LOSE YOUR RIDING PRIVILEGE!"

- 1. Be on time for pick ups/drop offs.
- 2. Do not enter or leave the bus while it is in motion.
- 3. Always pass in front of the bus, never behind, when loading or unloading from the bus.
- 4. Occupy the seat assigned by the driver or monitor.
- 5. Remain seated until the bus has reached your destination.
- 6. Head or arms must not be extended from the windows.
- 7. Students will not throw any objects from the bus.
- 8. Large objects may not be carried on the bus due to D.O.T. regulations.
- 9. The bus driver and/or the monitor are to be obeyed at all times. Riding the bus is a privilege and drivers are instructed to report students who do not obey these rules.
- 10. Drinking, eating, cursing, swearing or loud talking are prohibited.
- 11. Please refrain from driving your car or parking in the bus circle during the hours of: 7:45 am to 8:05 am and 2:45 pm to 3:05 pm.

LATE BUS

Late buses will run on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday nights at 4:00 pm October, November, December, April, May and June. Late buses will run on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday nights at 4:00 pm January, February and March. These buses are for students who are involved with homework club, school clubs, review classes, computer lab time, students receiving detention, and some sports teams. There will be a north run (Ellicottville-Mansfield) and a south run (Great Valley-Humphrey area) that will cover most areas of our school district.

ECS TRANSPORTATION PROCEDURES

One of the most important things we are charged with at school is the safety of our student body. A number of you drop off or pick-up your children at school either in the morning or in the afternoon. During high volume times, the traffic in our driveways becomes a serious point of concern for us. People have been observed making U-turns, three-point turns, and turning off the driveway onto the lawn area. Some have even passed stopped school busses in the loop in front of the school.

The Board of Education has authorized the following procedures for you to follow when dropping off or picking up children at school. They are listed here for your information and use:

1. No traffic will be permitted anywhere in front of the school while buses are in the loop:


Mornings 7:45-8:05 am Afternoons 2:45-3:05 pm Late Bus 3:50-4:05 pm

Elementary: The preferred arrival time for students

being driven to school is after 8:05 am. The preferred pick-up time is 3:05-3:10 pm. **MS/HS:** The preferred arrival time for students being driven to school is 7:45 am. Students must report to the cafeteria.

- 2. When entering the school for the elementary, please enter the driveway at the North end by the playground and leave by the high school end.
- 3. When entering to go to the high school, please enter and exit the driveway at the south end near the high school.
- 4. Arrival: elementary students must be signed in and will be recorded late after 8:15 am.
- 5. Dismissal: Please come in and sign your child out in the office. Children will be waiting inside the school for you. We will not be able to call classrooms for your child if you arrive early for pick-ups.
- 6. If you MUST drop off or pick up a student during times busses are in the loop, please park in one of our lots. No one will be permitted to park in the driveway.
- 7. **It is against the law** to pass any school bus that is stopped and has its red lights flashing. Yield to busses in the parking lot and driveways.

Please make certain you promptly pick up your child by 4:00 pm from after school activities. Thank you so much for your cooperation!

New College Credit Science Course Offered

Ellicottville Central School has recently approved a new course beginning in the 2015-2016 school year. Interested students will need to contact Mrs. Eddy to register.

Global Environment 3 credits (EFB 120): Students explore the linkages between local, rural, urban and suburban communities and the larger global ecosystem. Key environmental science themes and critical thinking skills form the basis for instructional activities.

Welcome to the Global Environment! Environmental problems make headlines every day. How can we help to develop participatory citizens who understand the complex scientific and social issues behind the headlines, make informed decisions, and meet these environmental challenges? How can you help shape the environmental future for the 21st Century and beyond?

The *Global Environment* will help you to gain the knowledge and tools to make informed decisions regarding the environment and the earth's future and to be able to understand the connections between such varied topics as pollution, deforestation, climate change, acid rain, soil depletion, economics, evolution, history and social justice. The course stresses a science based systems approach in evaluating problems and potential solutions as well as the critical role of energy in many of the environmental challenges facing the world.

The *Global Environment* emphasizes the strengths and utility of environmental science, a complex and multifaceted discipline of the natural and social sciences whose dimensions are exemplified by several unifying themes: (1) relationships among organisms and their environment (including atmosphere, land, and wa-

ter), (2) population growth of humans, (3) human social systems, (4) sustainability of natural resources, and (5) urban ecosystems.

In addition, the *Global Environment* will give you a historical background to build upon. The same forces at work today, which define the current state of our world, have been at work for the earth's entire history. The course will help you to understand the role of these forces in the evolution of humankind and the development of human culture, thus giving you a context to understand the roots and complexities of today's environmental challenges.

The *Global Environment* deals with the "Big Questions" not from strictly economic, environmental, or biological approaches, but from an integration of both the social and physical sciences. This interdisciplinary approach allows for a clearer view of reality that makes the *Global Environment* unlike any other environmental course. The varied topics are connected from an energy and systems perspective during every class and it is this integration that makes learning interesting and exiting and also makes the *Global Environment* unique.

<u>Prerequisites:</u> Global Environment (EFB120): students must have successfully completed NYS Regents Earth Science, NYS Regents Biology, and have successfully completed or are enrolled in NYS Regents Chemistry.

Student Cost: The cost for the 3 credit course is \$780.00 per course, however special ESF Scholarships reduce the cost per course to \$200. Similar reductions are in effect for 2 and 1 credit courses. Students who participate in the Free/Reduced lunch program may receive additional scholarship monies to reduce course fees to \$75.

Fifth Grade Class Video Wins Human Rights Contest

In a clear testament to the kindness and empathy of our young students, Mrs. Moore's 5th grade class of last year entered and won a contest entitled *Everyone Has Rights*. Sponsored by the New York State United Teachers and the Robert F. Kennedy Center for Justice and Human Rights, this contest invited students in grades K-5 from across New York to create a 60-90 second video that would inspire viewers to embrace the importance of human rights worldwide. Students were encouraged to learn about human rights violations that children their own age are experiencing around the world. What an eye-opening experience for them! As they read about and discussed this issue, Mrs. Moore's students decided to focus on the right of decency. To see their award-winning video, go to www.everyonehasrights.com.

But that's not where their powerful story ends. After learning that the class won \$175 (\$100 for classroom supplies and \$75 for a party), the students took little time to realize that their winnings must go toward a worthy cause rather than a class celebration. How many 5th grade students pass up an opportunity for a party? These students chose the Cleveland House for their donation, a lovely place where people awaiting, or recovering from, liver transplants can stay at low cost.

Letter to Parents for School Meal Programs

Dear Parent/Guardian:

Children need healthy meals to learn. Ellicottville Central School offers healthy meals every school day. Breakfast costs \$1.10; lunch costs \$1.80 K-4 & \$2.05 5-12. Your children may qualify for free meals or for reduced price meals. Reduced price is \$0.25 for breakfast and \$0.25 for lunch.

- 1. DO I NEED TO FILL OUT AN APPLICATION FOR EACH CHILD? No. Complete the application to apply for free or reduced price meals. Use one Free and Reduced Price School Meals Application for all students in your household. We cannot approve an application that is not complete, so be sure to fill out all required information. Return the completed application to: Vicky Williams, 5873 Rte 219 S, Ellicottville, NY 14731.
- 2. WHO CAN GET FREE MEALS? All children in households receiving benefits from SNAP, the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations or TANF, can get free meals regardless of your income. Also, your children can get free meals if your household's gross income is within the free limits on the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines.
- 3. Can foster children get free meals? Yes, foster children that are under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or court, are eligible for free meals. Any foster child in the household is eligible for free meals regardless of income.
- 4. CAN HOMELESS, RUNAWAY, AND MIGRANT CHILDREN GET FREE MEALS? Yes, children who meet the definition of homeless, runaway, or migrant qualify for free meals. If you haven't been told your children will get free meals, please call or e-mail Tina Barrett 699-2904 to see if they qualify.
- 5. WHO CAN GET REDUCED PRICE MEALS? Your children can get low cost meals if your household income is within the reduced price limits on the Federal Eligibility Income Chart, shown on this application.
- 6. SHOULD I FILL OUT AN APPLICATION IF I RECEIVED A LETTER THIS SCHOOL YEAR SAYING MY CHILDREN ARE APPROVED FOR FREE MEALS? Please read the letter you got carefully and follow the instructions. Call the school at 699-2316x403 if you have questions.
- 7. MY CHILD'S APPLICATION WAS APPROVED LAST YEAR. DO I NEED TO FILL OUT ANOTHER ONE? Yes. Your child's application is only good for that school year and for the first 30 school days of this school year. You must send in a new application unless the school told you that your child is eligible for the new school year.
- 8. I GET WIC. CAN MY CHILD(REN) GET FREE MEALS? Children in households participating in WIC may be eligible for free or reduced price meals. Please fill out a FREE/REDUCED PRICE MEAL application.
- 9. WILL THE INFORMATION I GIVE BE CHECKED? Yes and we may also ask you to send written proof.
- 10. IF I DON'T QUALIFY NOW, MAY I APPLY LATER? Yes, you may apply at any time during the school year. For example, children with a parent or guardian who becomes unemployed may become eligible for free and reduced price meals if the household income drops below the income limit.
- 11. WHAT IF I DISAGREE WITH THE SCHOOL'S DECISION ABOUT MY APPLICATION? You should talk to school officials. You also may ask for a hearing by calling or writing to: Mark Ward, 699-2368 x301, 5873 Rte 219 S, Ellicottville, NY 14731
- 12. MAY I APPLY IF SOMEONE IN MY HOUSEHOLD IS NOT A U.S. CITIZEN? Yes. You or your child(ren) do not have to be U.S. citizens to qualify for free or reduced price meals.
- 13. WHO SHOULD I INCLUDE AS MEMBERS OF MY HOUSEHOLD? You must include all people living in your household, related or not (such as grandparents, other relatives, or friends) who share income and expenses. You must include yourself and all children living with you. If you live with other people who are economically independent (for example, people who you do not support, who do not share income with you or your children, and who pay a pro-rated share of expenses), do not include them.
- 14. WHAT IF MY INCOME IS NOT ALWAYS THE SAME? List the amount that you normally receive. For example, if you normally make \$1000 each month, but you missed some work last month and only made \$900, put down that you made \$1000 per month. If you normally get overtime, include it, but do not include it if you only work overtime sometimes. If you have lost a job or had your hours or wages reduced, use your current income.
- 15. WE ARE IN THE MILITARY. DO WE INCLUDE OUR HOUSING ALLOWANCE AS INCOME? If you get an off-base housing allowance, it must be included as income. However, if your housing is part of the Military Housing Privatization Initiative, do not include your housing allowance as income.
- 16. MY SPOUSE IS DEPLOYED TO A COMBAT ZONE. IS HER COMBAT PAY COUNTED AS INCOME? No, if the combat pay is received in addition to her basic pay because of her deployment and it wasn't received before she was deployed, combat pay is not counted as income. Contact your school for more information.
- 17. MY FAMILY NEEDS MORE HELP. ARE THERE OTHER PROGRAMS WE MIGHT APPLY FOR? To find out how to apply for SNAP or other assistance benefits,

How to Apply: To get free or reduced price meals for your children you may submit an Eligibility Letter for Free Meals received from the NYS Education Department, OR carefully complete one application for your household and return it to the designated office. If you now receive SNAP, Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) for any children, or participate in the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR), the application must include the children's names, the household food stamp, TANF or FDPIR case number and the signature of an adult household member. All children should be listed on the same application. Dental Certificates

 A dental certificate is requested for all newly entering students and students in Pre-K, Kindergarten, Grades 2, 4,7 and 10.

Asbestos Containing Materials

In compliance with Sections 763.85 and .93 of the asbestos-containing materials in schools rule, all facilities owned, leased or operated by the Ellicottville Central School District have been inspected for the presence of asbestos-containing building materials. Asbestos management plans have been developed for all facilities and submitted to the NYS Education Department. The E.P.A. requires re-inspections every five (5) years by an accredited asbestos inspector. This re-inspection was done on October 2012, and the results were reviewed by an accredited management planner. The 2012 re-inspection found no significant changes in the condition of the asbestos-containing materials. In general, the asbestos materials in the district are in good condition and will continue to be managed as recommended by the accredited management planner. Copies of the management plans are available for public inspections and management plans should be made to Kevin Blendinger, Maintenance Supervisor, at 716-699-2316 (ext. 404).

Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA)

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), a Federal law, requires that the Ellicottville Central School District, with certain exceptions, obtain your written consent prior to the disclosure of personally identifiable information from your child's education records. However, the Ellicottville Central School District may disclose appropriately designated "directory information" without written consent, unless you have advised the District to the contrary in accordance with District procedures. The primary purpose of directory information is to all the Ellicottville Central School District to include this type of information from your child's education records in certain school publications. Examples may include:

- a playbill, showing your student's role in a drama production;
- · the annual yearbook;
- honor roll or other recognition lists;
- graduation programs; and
- sports activity sheets, such as for football, showing weight and height of team members.

Directory information, which is information that is generally not considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if released, can also be disclosed to outside organizations without a parent's prior written consent. Outside organizations include, but are not limited to, companies that manufacture class rings or publish yearbooks. In addition, two federal laws require local educational agencies (LEAs) receiving assistance under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA) to provide military recruiters, upon request, with three directory information categories - names, addresses and telephone listings - unless parents have advised the LEA that they do not want their student's information disclosed without prior written consent.(1)

If you do not want the Ellicottville Central School District to disclose directory information from your child's education records without your prior written consent, you must notify the District in writing by September 30, 2015. The Ellicottville Central School District has designated the following information as directory information

(1) These laws are: Section 9528 of the ESEA (20 U.s.C. 7908), as amended by the *No Child Left Behind Act of 2001* (P.L. 107-110), the education bill, and 10 U.S.C. 503, as amended by section 544, the *National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2002* (P.L. 107-107), the legislation that provides funding for the Nation's armed forces.

Sex Offender Registry Website

The purpose of this site is to provide an overview of the sex offender registration law and how the public can obtain information about sex offenders. The Sex Offender Registration Act, New York's version of Megan's Law, was signed by Governor George E. Pataki in July 1995 and became effective on January 21, 1996. The text of the statute is contained in Correction Law Article 6-C (Section 168 et seq.).

Registered sex offenders in New York are classified by the risk of reoffense. A court determines whether an offender is a level 1 (low risk), 2 (moderate risk) or 3 (high risk). The court also determines whether an offender should be given the designation of a sexual predator, sexually violent offender or predicate sex offender. Sex offenders registered on or after March 11, 2002 register for a minimum of 10 years unless they have been given a designation. If they have been given a designation, they register for life.

Level 1 and 2 sex offenders registered prior to March 11, 2002 register for 10 years while level 3 offenders register for life. For more information on sex offenders residing in our district, please visit the following web address: http://criminaljustice.state.ny.us
