Meganne Chapman is the daughter of Tim and Stacey Chapman. She is graduating as the Salutatorian with



student must complete one year of training, which is every Tuesday from 3-4. In addition, the student must complete twenty-five hours of tutoring. This is a lot of work on top of an already




busy schedule of academics and sports. *Congratulations Katie!*

The Basic Budget will provide funds for all educationally related services and the maintenance of our school building.


ARTAND BOOKS TRIP!

WHAT WILL STAY THE SAME?


- Grading and access to the parent portal for updated grades


1st Grade Trip to Shea's
