# UPDATE ON PROPOSED IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

Over 30 community members, Board Members, staff and administration met with the District's architects, construction manager and financial planners on November 13th. The group reviewed some proposed renovations, building improvements, rough designs, as well as some projected costs.

The meeting was very productive in getting some new ideas and even some changes in the design of how we might reconfigure some of the space in the building. This was the first time that we were able to connect estimated costs with actual work so it helped us in wrapping our arms around what the scope of the project could eventually look like.

While no final decisions were made, the Board instructed the architects to revisit the design of the gym that was suggested by several of the community members. This area includes the positioning of the gym, new locker rooms, band and chorus rooms and how to incorporate a stage that can be used for productions. In the current proposal, many of the gym seats will have backs that will provide a more comfortable seat for athletic events, cultural activities, assemblies, community use and events associated with our music department.

The group also looked at a number of other improvements that were highlighted in the October/November Newsletter. Some improvements have to be included since they have been identified through our Building Condition Survey. Several items, due to the excessive cost and limited state aid, have already been eliminated.

The next meeting will be held on Tuesday, December 18th, at 7:00 PM in the High School Library.


We are especially excited about the level of community collaboration for this event. In par-

## Environmental Science Class VISITS NATURALIST

On Thursday, November 8th, the ECS Environmental Science Class had an opportunity to spend the morning with Allegany State Park Naturalist Adele Wellman. Ms. Wellman is currently working on a population survey of Gypsy Moths to determine approaches to control their spread throughout the Park.

The class was introduced to field sampling methods used to determine if


certain areas need to have pest control in place. After learning how and where to identify the egg cases, the students did a count on lower tree infestations and then upper tree counts as well. The class sampled three random areas and then computed the amounts of egg cases that would be found in an acre of land. While NYS normally uses their own professionals for these studies, the students discovered that there was a fairly

substantial population in the areas studied.

Following the wrap up of the Gypsy Moth activity, the class met up with Tom LeBlanc and Darren Bierfeldt. These two are ASP Wildlife experts and were in the process of the year's last release of Ring Neck Pheasants. Our students were taught proper handling techniques and helped in the release of the Pheasants.

Not only did she once again answer the challenge and help finish off that match in straight sets, but against a very strong and determined Forestville team. Grace played a game none of us will soon forget. She helped lead her team to another straight set victory, and then again at JCC in the first round of the Section 6

playoffs against North Collins.

A new comer to the team this year was Hannah Gerwitz. Hannah stepped up in the right front position each time there was an injury, playing Grace's position when Grace had to help in other areas. Hannah did a great job in those moments when needed, and her attitude and effort in practice was contagious.

Kayla Dunkleman brought a whole new confidence to our team this season. She played unbelievable defense and served an average of 7-10 points per set, getting the team points to get ahead, stay ahead and finish games. Kayla's serving kept getting better all season, and in the playoffs and at states, her serving was consistently dominant.



The next two players' impact on the team was not as unknown outside of the team as the others may have been. The twin towers, 9 & 12, Janae Hamilton and Courtney Scanlan, blasted ball after ball to the other side, and with their aggressive blocking they blocked balls all season from coming to our side. Both players had an unbelievable jump serve that they kept improving on throughout the season. Janae had a record breaking moment serving Ripley 25-0 during the season, which is

unheard of, as well as being accomplished less than 5 times in high school volleyball.

The Lady Eagles did not only go undefeated all season, they did it very much with ease on the court. They rolled through their sectional matches and at the Far West Regionals against Lyons, they took control early and dominated again in straight sets. The Eagles headed to states relatively healthy and players were at their normal positions. The first day was pool play, and off the bat the Eagles were matched up with perennial contender and defending champion Haldane. The Eagles gave everyone notice of their intentions when they took Haldane down 25-10 in the first set. They went on to close them out, then Hartford and Lafayette all in convincing wins, and closed out pool play undefeated. The next day in the finals for the state championship, the Eagles knew that Haldane was not going to go down without a fight. There were moments of stress for the Eagles, but a reminder to stay focused, positive and in the moment rang through the Eagle's huddle. They played all season with the mindset of forgetting the last point, good or bad, and making sure they were ready and focused for the next point, and this was never more needed. The Eagles clawed their way to a 2 sets to none lead. As they entered the 3rd set they knew it would be the easiest yet the hardest they would have to work to finish Haldane off and it was! The Eagles finished their State Championship season with an undefeated record of 27-0.

## From the Nurse: ECS CONCUSSION PROTOCOL

I have been receiving many questions as to what we implement in the school for head injuries. With all of the new information coming out daily, it is definitely a work in progress. As per our district policy, information from our athletic director, and guidance from our Medical Director – ECS has been implementing the following protocol:

#### CONCUSSION PROTOCOL FOR ECS

- If head injury takes place, the student/athlete will be removed immediately from play or activity.
- Student/athlete will be assessed for signs/symptoms of concussion.
- Any positive emergent signs/symptoms student should be referred at once for emergency medical care (confusion, unusual behavior or responsiveness, deteriorating condition, loss of consciousness, or concern about neck and spine injury).
- If no emergency is apparent remove from play for rest of day (monitor every 5-10 minutes for at least 30 minutes) and have student see medical provider.
- ANY head injury will be reported to parents.
- Once cleared by primary care physician:
  - ♦ School Nurse to assess student for any lingering signs or symptoms of concussion.
  - ♦ School Nurse to fax clearance, along with her findings, to

- school's Medical Director for review and final clearance (as per District Policy).
- ♦ If cleared, student to follow "Return to Play" Protocol:

<u>Return to Play Protocol</u> (taken from NYS Public High School Athletic Association):

- 1. No exertional activity until asymptomatic.
- 2. When the student/athlete appears clear, may begin low-impact activity such as walking, stationary bike, etc.
- 3. Initiate aerobic activity fundamental to specific sport such as skating, running, etc.
- 4. Begin non-contact skill drills specific to sport such as dribbling, ground balls, batting, etc.
- 5. Then full contact in practice setting.
- 6. If student/athlete remains without symptoms, he or she may return to play.


#### NOTE:

- Student/athlete must remain asymptomatic to progress to the next level.
- ➤ If symptoms return, the student/ athlete must return to the previous level.
- ➤ Medical check should occur before contact.


