District Identifies Focus Areas for School Year

Every year the District identifies several areas that we plan to focus on throughout the course of the year. This year we have highlighted six items that will clearly impact student achievement, and will also involve educational experiences our students will enjoy.

- 1. Completion of our Strategic Plan The various committees will continue to meet and input will be gathered from stakeholders through the use of several surveys as we seek to complete the review of the plan and bring recommendations to the Board in January 2016.
- 2. Curriculum/Instruction This is an area that will always remain a focus area for our school. We are planning to place additional resources in the middle school to add more support to AIS (Academic Intervention Services) for ELA and math. This will involve more staff to break down AIS into smaller groups. Team teaching and additional support in regular classrooms is also planned.
- 3. Explore and Appreciate Our New Facilities This pretty much speaks for itself! With the new spaces for performances, interscholastic sports, physical education, fitness, band and chorus it will be a "learning experience" for everyone.

- 4. Technology The purchase of 145 Dell laptops for students in grades 10-12 and the updating of two labs will certainly have an impact on the use of technology. Students will be able to work on projects, take advantage of the school's wireless network and take computers home each night for research and to work on assignments. Every student will have an equal opportunity and access to their own computer!
- 5. Smart Schools Grant With the passage of this grant by the New York State voters in November 2014, Ellicottville Central School will have access to \$344,000 after December 15, 2015 (according to the information we have at this time). The District has developed a plan for the grant that will include the purchase of a new security system (software and cameras) and forty Cleartouch Interactive Screens for every classroom.
- 6. Elementary Computer Science We are implementing a new program in the elementary where students will receive basic computer instruction making sure students know how to type, can use Microsoft Office, and have command of the different computer keyboard functions. Grade level instruction will also follow a designed curriculum to ensure skills are taught and reinforced. Heather Reed, TA with the District, will take the lead on this new curriculum addition.



Learning about 'Katy and the Big Snow'

The State D.O.T. provided a safety program for kindergarteners revolving around a book – <u>Katy and the Big Snow</u>. After listening to the story in Library with Mrs. Dunkleman, a D.O.T crew drove Katy the Snowplow into our parking lot. The children were eager to investigate the large truck and learn about its workings. Then the focus shifted to the importance of remaining a safe distance away from plows when they come down the street. A heartfelt thanks to everyone who helped put on such a great program for our little Eagles!

So the journey continued ... The setting was Spencerport High School near Rochester. The Ellicottville Eagles were to face Alfred-Almond, a Section 5 powerhouse. With the Eagles facing every challenge presented to them, the scoreboard read 0–0. The game went into overtime. One OT was not enough as neither team was willing to let in a goal. After 110 minutes, the scoreboard still read 0–0. The game came down to a Penalty Kick Shootout. Unfortunately, the Eagles lost 3–2 in the shootout and Alfred-Almond was awarded the right to advance to State Semi-Finals.

It was an incredible journey and I am so fortunate to have taken it with such fine

young men. They formed a brotherhood on this voyage that will be remembered forever.

The Eagles were awarded many post season awards from both the league and the local newspapers. Jack Haley was named to League Honorable Mention team. Matt Proctor, Quinn O'Rourke, Cameron Eddy and Nick DiDonato were named 2nd Team All-Stars. Matt DiDonato and Cole Lapi were named 1st Team League All-Stars.

At the awards banquet, Aidan Rozler was presented the Coach's Award, and Robert Spell earned the Most Improved Player Award.

Along with the team MVP award, Cole Lapi was also named League Defensive MVP. The Olean Times Herald named Lapi a Big 30 All-Star, and he was also honored by the Buffalo News as a WNY First Team All-Star.
