Meeting set for Tuesday, September 13th: **BOARD LOOKING AT FACILITY UPGRADES & IMPROVEMENTS**

The Board of Education and administration have been reviewing the District Building Condition Survey that was filed with the State last year in an effort to identify areas of need. When the District developed their Strategic Plan in 2009 one of the recommendations from the process was modernization and improvement to the District's facilities. The statement below was one of the recommendations made by the Fiscal/Facilities Task Force:

"We will investigate the physical needs of the buildings in planning to modernize our 1960's areas and consider the possibility of a future project to provide facility upgrades, maintenance and educational improvements with a 60% voter approval."

The Board is inviting interested parents and District residents to participate in a walk-through of the facilities on Tuesday, September 13, at 7:00 PM to view first hand some of the areas that the District may target for improvements. The area that discussions will center on will be the parts of the building dating back to 1962

that have never been addressed as well as some items in the elementary wing opened in 1988.

The building was actually opened in 1961 and the first class to graduate from the "new school" was the Class of 1962 who celebrated their 50th reunion this summer at the annual Ellicottville Alumni Celebration. When the building opened, it replaced many different sites within the community that were used as classrooms. Those included the Murphy House (in front of the "new school"), Signore Building, Old Barn in Maybee Alley, Town Hall, Historical Building, Old Post Office, Waldo House, Milk House and McCadden's Restaurant. Needless to say education, teaching and how we use

the building today is far different than it was in 1962.

Like any facility that is over 50 years old, there are going to be a number of items that need upgrades based on the changes in education, program needs, safety and health issues, ever changing technology, State mandates and the "functionality" of areas within the building. It is important to make sure that we maintain the community's investment in our school and provide our students with a facility that will meet the challenges of 21st century learning.

We would like to begin a dialogue on addressing the needs outlined in the report as well as upgrades that will position our school for the future. While the District could continue to use District reserves to address upgrades and improvements, these come at 100% cost to the taxpayers. Developing a targeted project approved by the voters will allow us to access State funding which is estimated to result in a 65% return. In other words, for every dollar we spend the State will reimburse us for 65 cents. Fiscally, this is a much better way to approach school improvements than literally "going alone."

The Board plans to hold a short meeting after the "walkthrough" to review some of the things that the report has highlighted as well as the groups observations and our own experience with the present facilities.

ATTENTION STUDENTS: INTERESTED IN A SKI TRIP TO VERMONT?

Students from the ski club have expressed an interest in a ski trip this year. In the past we have done this when there has been sufficient interest from our students. I am currently collecting proposals for a trip during the Winter Break from February 16th – 24th, in the Vermont area. Areas being considered include Okemo, Mt. Snow, Stowe and possibly some more as soon as we get all our proposals in.

This would be a chaperoned trip based on a minimum of forty (40), students attending. Included in the trip would be transportation, lodging, ski passes and breakfasts and dinners while in Vermont. Items not included in the package price would be meals en route, lunches at the ski area and any souvenirs the student purchases. In order to control costs, extras on the trip will be limited.

It is still too early to quote an exact price for the trip, however we are looking at prices that start around \$300 and increase with components of the packages. Information will be distributed to the students prior to the parent meeting to be scheduled during September.

A deposit will be required to cover transportation costs from ECS to the ski area and be collected before the end of October. This will be a nonrefundable deposit because we will still need to pay a lump sum for the motor coach and driver. A higher number of students participating will decrease this part of the cost of the trip.

SEX OFFENDER REGISTRY WEBSITE

The purpose of this site is to provide an overview of the sex offender registration law and how the public can obtain information about sex offenders. The Sex Offender Registration Act, New York's version of Megan's Law, was signed by Governor George E. Pataki in July 1995 and became effective on January 21, 1996. The text of the statute is contained in Correction Law Article 6-C (Section 168 et seq.).

Registered sex offenders in New York are classified by the risk of reoffense. A court determines whether an offender is a level 1 (low risk), 2 (moderate risk) or 3 (high risk). The court also determines whether an offender should be given the designation of a sexual predator, sexually violent offender or predicate sex offender. Sex offenders registered on or after March 11, 2002 register for a minimum of 10 years unless they have been given a designation. If they have been given a designation, they register for life.

Level 1 and 2 sex offenders registered prior to March 11, 2002 register for 10 years while level 3 offenders register for life. For more information on sex offenders residing in our district, please visit the following web address: http://criminaljustice.state.ny.us

BMI SCREENING EXCLUSION FORM

As part of a required school health examination, a student is weighed and his/her height is measured. These numbers are used to fgure out the student's body mass index or "BMI." The BMI helps the doctor or nurse know if the student's weight is in a healthy range or is too high or too low. Recent changes to the New York State Education Law require that BMI and weight status group be included as part of the student's school health examination. A sample of school districts will be selected to take part in a survey by the New York State Department of Health. If our school is selected to be part of the survey, we will be reporting to New York State Department of Health information about our stucents' weight status groups. Only summary information is sent. No names and no information about individual students are sent. However, you may choose to have your child's information excluded from this survey report.

The information sent to the New York State Department of Health will help health officials develop programs that make it easier for children to be healthier.

SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES

Dear Parent/Guardian:

The district's School Health Services program supports your student's academic success by promoting health in the school setting. One way that we provide care for your student is by performing health screenings as mandated by the State of New York.

During this school year, the following screenings will be required or completed at school:

Vision

- Distance acuity for all newly entering students and students in Pre-K, Kindergarten, Grades 1,2,3,5,7 and 10.
- Near vision acuity, hyperopia and color perception screening for all newly entering students.

<u>Hearing</u>

- Hearing screening for all newly entering students and students in Kindergarten, Grades 1,3,5,7 and 10. Scoliosis
- Scoliosis (spinal curvature) screening for all students in Grades 5-9.

Health Appraisals

- A physical examination including Body Mass Index and Weight Status Category Information is required for all newly entering students and students in Pre-K, Kindergarten, Grades 2,4,7 and 10, and all students playing sports.
- Physicals are done by the School Physician's PA during the regular school day. Students who prefer to be examined by their own physician may obtain the appropriate forms from the Health Office.

Dental Certificates

• A dental certificate is requested for all newly entering students and students in Kindergarten, Grades 2, 4,7 and 10.

A letter will be sent home if there are any findings on the screenings done at school that would cause concern or need medical follow-up. Please call the school's Health Office if you have any questions or concerns.

Dear Parent/Guardian:

Children need healthy meals to learn. Ellicottville Central School offers healthy meals every school day. Breakfast costs\$1.00; lunch costs \$1.60(K-4)/\$1.85(5-12). Your children may qualify for free meals or for reduced price meals. Reduced price is \$0.25 for breakfast and \$0.25 for lunch.

- Do I need to fill out an application for each child? No. Complete the application to apply for free or reduced price meals. Use one Free and Reduced Price School Meals Application for all students in your household. We cannot approve an application that is not complete, so be sure to fill out all required information. Return the completed application to: Vicky Williams, Ellicottville Central School, 5873 Route 219S, Ellicottville, NY 14731
- Who can get free meals? All children in households receiving benefits from food stamps, the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations or TANF, can get free meals regardless of your income. Also, your children can get free meals if your household's gross income is within the free limits on the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines.
- 3. Can foster children get free meals? Yes, foster children that are under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or court, are eligible for free meals. Any foster child in the household is eligible for free meals regardless of income.
- 4. Can homeless, runaway, and migrant children get free meals? Yes, children who meet the definition of homeless, runaway, or migrant qualify for free meals. If you haven't been told your children will get free meals, please call or e-mail Tina Barrett 761-699-2316 x227, Ellicottville Central School, 5873 Route 219S, Ellicottville, NY 14731 to see if they qualify.
- 5. WHO CAN GET REDUCED PRICE MEALS? Your children can get low cost meals if your household income is within the reduced price limits on the Federal Eligibility Income Chart, shown on this application.
- SHOULD I FILL OUT AN APPLICATION IF I RECEIVED A LETTER THIS SCHOOL YEAR SAYING MY CHILDREN ARE APPROVED FOR FREE MEALS? Please read the letter you got carefully and follow the instructions. Call the school at Vicky Williams 716-699-2316x403 if you have questions.
- MY CHILD'S APPLICATION WAS APPROVED LAST YEAR. DO I NEED TO FILL OUT ANOTHER ONE? Yes. Your child's application is only good for that school year and for the first few days of this school year. You must send in a new application unless the school told you that your child is eligible for the new school year.
- 8. I GET WIC. CAN MY CHILD(REN) GET FREE MEALS? Children in households participating in WIC may be eligible for free or reduced price meals. Please fill out a FREE/REDUCED PRICE MEAL application.
- 9. Will the information I give be checked? Yes and we may also ask you to send written proof.
- 10. If I don't qualify now, may I apply later? Yes, you may apply at any time during the school year. For example, children with a parent or guardian who becomes unemployed may become eligible for free and reduced price meals if the household income drops below the income limit.
- What if I disagree with the school's decision about my application? You should talk to school officials. You also may ask for a hearing by calling or writing to: Bob Miller MS/HS Principal, Ellicottville Central School, 5873 Route 219S, NY 14731, bmiller@eville.wnyric.org.
- 12. May I apply if someone in my household is not a U.S. citizen? Yes. You or your child(ren) do not have to be U.S. citizens to qualify for free or reduced price meals.
- 13. Who should I include as members of my household? You must include all people living in your household, related or not (such as grandparents, other relatives, or friends) who share income and expenses. You must include yourself and all children living with you. If you live with other people who are economically independent (for example, people who you do not support, who do not share income with you or your children, and who pay a pro-rated share of expenses), do not include them.
- 14. What if my income is not always the same? List the amount that you normally receive. For example, if you normally make \$1000 each month, but you missed some work last month and only made \$900, put down that you made \$1000 per month. If you normally get overtime, include it, but do not include it if you only work overtime sometimes. If you have lost a job or had your hours or wages reduced, use your current income.
- 15. We are in the military do we include our housing allowance as income? If you get an off-base housing allowance, it must be included as income. However, if your housing is part of the Military Housing Privatization Initiative, do not include your housing allowance as income.
- 16. My spouse is deployed to a combat zone. Is her combat pay counted as income? No, if the combat pay is received in addition to her basic pay because of her deployment and it wasn't received before she was deployed, combat pay is not counted as income. Contact your school for more information.
- 17. My family needs more help. Are there other programs we might apply for? To find out how to apply for **food stamps** or other assistance benefits, contact your local assistance office or call **1-800-342-3009**.

How to Apply: To get free or reduced price meals for your children you may submit a Direct Certification letter received from the NYS Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance, OR carefully complete one application for your household and return it to the designated office. If you now receive food stamps, Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) for any children, or participate in the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR), the application must include the children's names, the household food stamp, TANF or FDPIR case number and the signature of an adult household member. The PTA material provides an overview of what your child may be learning by the end of each grade K-12 in mathematics and English language arts/literacy. It focuses on the key skills your child will learn in these subjects, which will build a strong foundation for success in the other subjects he or she studies throughout the school year. These guides are based on the new Common Core State Standards, which have been adopted by more than 40 states. These K-12 standards are informed by the highest state standards from across the country. If your child is meeting the expectations outlined in these standards, he or she will be well prepared for the next grade. The information provided in these guides may be used to help build a relationship with your child's teacher. You can do these by talking to his or her teacher regularly about how your child is doing — beyond parent-teacher conferences. At home, you can play an important role in setting high expectations and supporting your child in meeting them.

If your child needs a little extra help, work with his or her teacher to identify opportunities for how to practice at home. It is also a great idea to share ideas with your child's teacher if your child wants to learn more about a subject or to get involved with some extension activities.

The second resource is also a terrific resource in helping everyone understand the differences we now face with the change in the curriculum. Material on the 'engageny' website gives some clarity to how there has been a 'shift in focus.' Please take a look at the summary below:

PARENTS' RIGHT TO KNOW ADVISORY

Under the federal No Child Left Behind legislation (latest reauthorization of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act), parents are required to be given several official notifications:

1. Parents may request information regarding the qualifications of their child's Title I teachers ["Title I" Teachers are those supported by Federal Title I funds] and paraprofessional staff. Parents may request specific information as to the following:

- whether the teacher has met State qualifications and licensing criteria for the grade levels and subject areas in which the teacher provides instruction;
- whether the teacher is teaching under emergency or other provisional status throug which State qualification or licensing criteria have been waived;
- the baccalaureate degree major of the teacher and any other graduate certification or degree held by the teacher, and the field of discipline of the certification or degree, and
- whether the child is provided services by paraprofessionals, and, if so, the qualifications of that paraprofessional (assistant).

2. Section 9528(a)(1) of the legislation requires that each school district receiving Title I funds under No Child Left Behind shall provide, on a request made by military recruiters or an institution of higher education, access to secondary school students' names, addresses and telephone listings.

• A student or a parent may request that such information not be released without prior written parental consent. In order to make such a request, please contact the high school office at 699-2316 for further information. If you do not wish to have your student's information released to the military or to colleges without your expressed permission, you must send a signed, written statement to that effect to the high school office by the beginning of the school year.

Under the Sex Offender Registration Act (Megan's Law) information that is disseminated to the School District regarding the presence in the community of a convicted sex offender will be communicated to staff, community and local law enforcement officials in order to ensure that the offender does not have contact with children.

Any information which the School District receives regarding a sex offender from a source other than the Sex Offender Registry, and which is maintained independent of the requirements of Megan's Law, will be available from the District, upon written request to the District Office, in accordance with the Freedom of Information Law (FOIL).


