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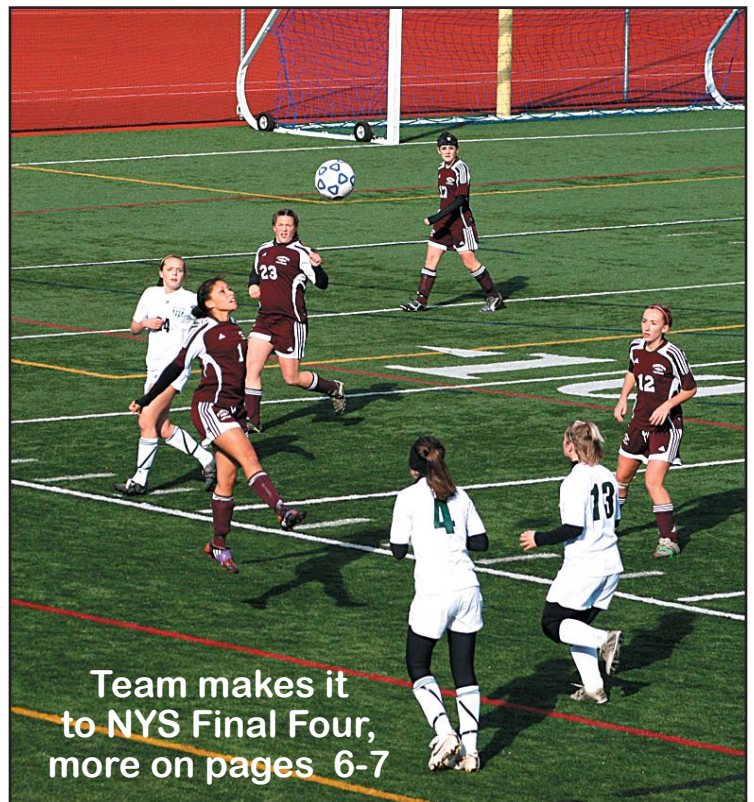
Lady Eagles Claim Far West Regional **CLASS D SOCCER CHAMPIONSHIP!**

The ECS Lady Eagles earned the top seed in the Section VI Class D Tournament and played the 4th seeded team, Pine Valley on Oct. 30th. In this sectional semi-final game, ECS dominated and outthusted the Pine Valley Lady Panthers, winning 4-0.

In the sectional finals the Lady Eagles of Ellicottville faced off with the Lady Eagles of North Collins. This opponent gave us the biggest challenge of any league foe this season but we were victorious in both of those league contests. However, playing a team a third time presents a stronger demand and our squad rose for the occasion. It didn't take long for us to find the net as we scored within 12 minutes of the opening whistle. Midway through the second half we scored another goal to seal the deal with a 2-0 win and the Section VI Class D title.

In the Far West Regional playoff game the Lady Eagles took on the best Class D team in Section V, Whitesville. Whitesville is the home of the Big 30 scoring leader so we knew this team was a force to be reckoned with. We knew we had to limit this prolific scorer's touches on the ball with smart, aggressive team defense. And that we did! She did put the power of teamwork to the test and her efforts fueled our drive to play even harder. Our organized defensive strategy allowed us to regain possession quickly and attack with speed and fast ball movement. Two goals within 6 minutes of each other in the first half boosted our confidence even more. The Lady Blue Jays did find the net with seventeen minutes

Part 2: PARENTS PLEASE STAY INVOLVED

This is the second part of a two part series on how parental involvement can help your child to succeed and excel in school. Here are a few more tips you may want to consider:

- When your children are young **make an effort to read to them every night**. Once they are able to read, encourage them to read to you!
- **Communicate frequently with the counselors**...Mr. Dan LaCroix (K-7) and Mrs. Tammy Eddy (8-12).
- **Attend meetings and take advantage of events** sponsored by the school that involve the sharing of information and insight into programs (i.e. grade level transitional changes, requirements for graduation, accelerated programs, financial aid).
- **Remember you are their parent first and their friend second**. Trying to be their friend may conflict with how a parent should respond.
- It is important to **establish a study routine; with a time and place to study/or do homework**.
- When looking for a gift, encourage family members to consider buying a book.
- **Seeking outside or professional help for your child** is not a sign of weaknesses or lack of parenting skills, rather it **is a sign that you recognize that you need some help and are not afraid to seek it out**.
- **Encourage your child to get extra help**...attend Homework Help Club, many teachers volunteer to stay after school to work with students, if you are not sure of what is available, contact Mrs. Eddy, Mr. LaCroix, Mrs. Poulin or Mr. Miller
- **As students transition to the high school** it is still very important that **you stay in touch and be involved with your children**. They need you, and, while they may not think so, they do. You may have to alter your approach, but don't think for a minute that they do not need your guidance, love, support and structure.
- **If you are noticing major changes in your child's behavior** make sure you do not take it lightly. It could be a sign of any number of things...ignoring it is the worst thing you can do. **Keep the lines of communication open**.

The purpose of this article was to provide you with some suggestions and to encourage you to stay actively involved in the lives of your children. Since we are educating students from the age of 4-21, the type of support and involvement will change with the age but that does not diminish the importance that it will play in their success.

Maybe it doesn't take a "village to raise a child" but it sure helps having a strong positive relationship between the family and school. The Ellicottville Central School prides itself on creating a "family" environment, and this relationship will play an important role in your child's future.

MAKING A WISE INVESTMENT

Our young people today will be facing a much different world than we have ever seen before. Most jobs in the global economy will require education and training beyond high school. The skills and knowledge needed to go to college will be the same skills that will be needed to go directly into the work force. The unskilled labor jobs as well as those related to manufacturing are disappearing and they have been replaced by jobs that require more technical skill and training.

So what does all of this mean? Whether you are an auto mechanic, electrician, office worker or in the building trades, these jobs will require high-tech skills and education after high school. There will be fewer and fewer jobs available for those

who only have a high school diploma. What might have worked for you as a parent, will not work for your children.

More education may not insure happiness but it will produce higher earnings. The U.S. Census Bureau estimates that the average high school graduate will earn \$1.2 million during their working career, compared to \$2.1 million that the average college graduate will make. This is a tremendous gap and one that will impact the quality of your life.

While we understand that a college education may not be the answer for everyone, it is a smart investment. Today, there are many two-year programs at junior colleges such as Jamestown Community College that students should explore. Many of these degrees or certificate programs are very specialized and will lead directly to employment.



The global economy is dramatically changing the type of work force and jobs that will be available for our graduates. We encourage parents and students to talk with Mrs. Eddy, Guidance Counselor, and learn more about the type of employment opportunities that are out there and the kind of educational training that they will need.

The Financial Literacy Certification Program addresses the urgent need that young people in the United States become financially literate.

Ellicottville Central Students worked on learning and preparing for this test, and, as a result, they earned that status of being a **Blue Star** school based on their excellent test results. Ellicottville Central School is the only school in Cattaraugus County to have achieved this distinction.

Once we were recognized as a **Blue Star** school, WISE reviewed the support and work that the teachers put forth in order to reach this achievement. Reflecting on our Past...

History of the Bank of Ellicottville and M&T Bank 1878-Present

The Bank of Ellicottville, along with M&T Bank, has had a long & storied history of serving the citizens of Ellicottville with their banking needs for 132 years. Organized on July 15, 1878, the Bank of Ellicottville began its' operation back on August 1, 1878 at the present site of the Ellicottville Historical building.

Their cashier at the time was Charles A. Case, who would later become president of the bank, and whose picture appears on the older interior photo of the bank on the display board.

In December 1890, the bank moved its location into a new brick building across the street, where they continued their operation right up until 1959. At the time of their move, their new building was equipped with the "latest burglar proof vaults and safes" to assure the safety of their depositors' funds.

This move may have been precipitated by the devastating fire that occurred on May 11, 1890. This fire destroyed the entire block of business places on the north side of Washington Street, from Jefferson to Monroe streets. However, the Bank of Ellicottville's original building escaped the wrath of this fire, primarily due to its sheet metal roof, which was able to repel the sparks and cinders that were raining down on it.

In 1959, the Bank of Ellicottville was merged into M&T Bank, which was, and still is, headquartered in Buffalo, New York. For 132 years, Ellicottville's residents have had their banking needs met by these two banking institutions.

The building in the picture at right was located on the corner of Monroe St. and Washington St. and was originally known as the **Irvine Hall Hotel** when it was built in 1837. It was run by Ben Baldwin, Amos Pettit, Pat Cady, Elisha Grover, George Senear and Jim Welsh.

In 1841 it was renamed "**The Eagle**" and became a theater. By 1845 it was the Irving Hotel again and in 1872 it burned. In 1885 Alexander Bird, a Civil War Veteran, built the brick "**Bird Block**" which is what we know as the Marketplace today.

The building has been the home to a variety of businesses over the past 100 plus years with a chronology of them listed below:

- 1897 Edward O'Rourke and Arthur Putnam established it as a **Funeral Home and Furniture Store**
- Mr. Payne opened the **Corner Drug Store** there in 1924

- Dr. Albert Smallman had his office upstairs from 1920-1956
- Fred Rider Sr. and Jr. had **law offices** there for many years
- **O'Rourke and O'Rourke Furniture and Wallpaper and Paint Store** was opened upstairs in 1940 and moved in 1956 to where Nature's Remedy is today.
- Ned O'Rourke later bought the former **Shankland House (now Jefferson B & B)** and moved the funeral home there.
- Harry Emke moved the **Red & White Grocery Store** from Washington St. to this building in 1963 until it closed in 1970.
- **Brooks Market** took over in 1970 with **Brooks Down Under** (a clothing store) added in the basement after 1982.

Since 1987 the Marketplace has hosted a variety of stores and shops and is alive today with a variety of shopping options!

VARSITY BOYS SOCCER 2010

The Boys Varsity Soccer Team completed its fall season this year with a crushing loss to North Collins in the Section 6 Sectional Title game. The Eagles scored first, 10 minutes into the second half. 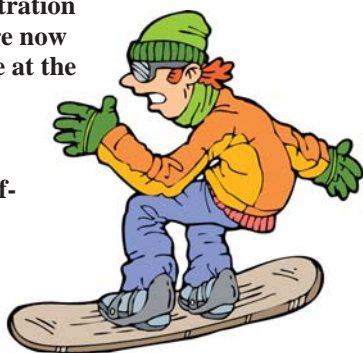

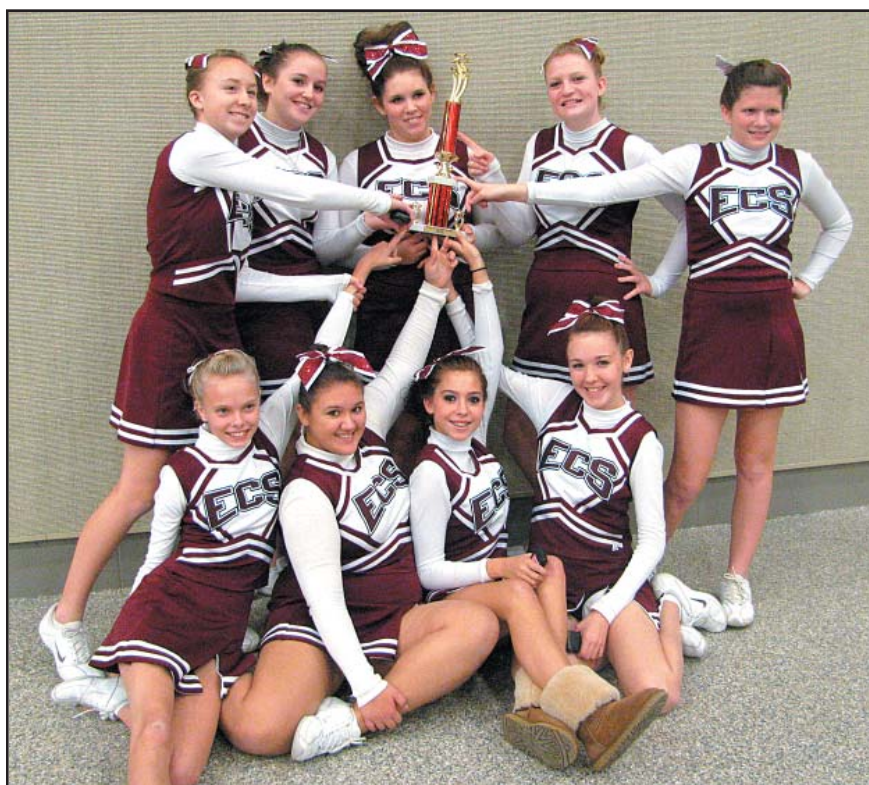

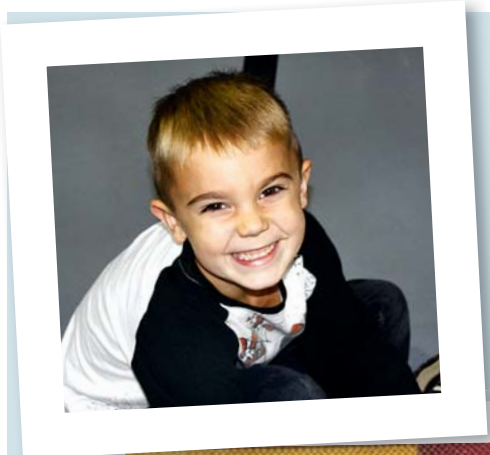
