Halfway Through the 2021-22 School Year!

By the time you receive this newsletter, the first half of the school year will be over. At times it has been a little hectic trying to figure all the changes that COVID has caused, but, more importantly, it has been successful. With the exception of 8 days that we had to switch to remote learning, ECS has been open for in-person instruction 5 days a week! It sure has been nice to have the students back in a more regular capacity.

We are now working on plans to move forward in a manner that ensures safety while restoring opportunities and activities:

- Youth basketball is up and running.
- The VEX robotics team will be engaged in an in-person competition in February.
- We have scheduled a MS/HS Band and Chorus concert for Wednesday, March 9th.
- National Honor Society is looking for dates for an Induction Ceremony.
- The High School is planning a Winter Weekend Dance.
- It is anticipated that we will have a HS Musical late winter/early spring.

COVID continues to present obstacles, but we remain committed to overcoming these obstacles. We will

continue to partner with the Cattaraugus County Health Department (CCHD) to offer vaccination clinics. I would like to commend and thank parents that obtained free COVID Test Kits from NYS through the school. If you have not yet had a chance to pick up a kit for your child/ children, please call 716-699-6052 and leave a message; we will get back to you to make arrangements to obtain these kits. As NYS and the CCHD have put a hold on their contact tracing / quarantine program, we, too, will dramatically scale back on these items as well. Hopefully, sooner than later, we will be able to kick COVID and its impact on the school system to the curb; allowing for the school to return to more "normal" activities and schedules.

January-March is also the time of the year when we really start digging into the creation of the 2022-23 School Year Budget. New York State has released its estimates for School Aid next year, but these are estimates and they can still change. We have reviewed our current estimated numbers, and it appears that while several categories are over-estimated (this is a regular occurrence for ECS), we hope to see about a 3% increase in foundation aid which equals approximately \$88,000. Unfortunately, Ellicottville will not see any of the "extra" aid payments some of our neighbors are receiving as we have already been "fully funded" over recent years per the formulas. At the same time, we have been notified of a number of increases that we will see for the 2022-23 fiscal year. These areas include (but are not limited to): health insurance, BOCES services (both CA and Erie 1 BOCES), utilities, and retirement systems payments. We also know that the "tax cap" (the small part of the overall tax picture that we control) will be 2% this year. While the District may need to exceed the tax cap this year, it is still too early to know this for sure until we can complete additional work on the budget. The budget will start to take its final shape throughout the month of March.

As we head into the 2nd half of the year, I have high hopes for the ECS Students and Community. We have better learned how to cope with COVID and mitigate its impact on the school. We are starting to see activities and events that have been missing for almost 2 years. The NYS budget and aid estimates look better than the past few years. The days are getting longer and the nights are getting shorter. Spring is just around the corner and will be here before we know it. The future is certainly looking brighter at ECS!

Ellicottville Central National Honor Society is hosting a "Send Love to the Animals" campaign during the month of February. We are partnered with E.A.R.S. and will be accepting: PURINA dry and wet cat/dog food, scoopable litter and monetary donations. There will be a bin placed in the high school fover for food/ litter drop off during normal school hours. Checks can be made out to: ECS National Honor Society. They can be mailed to ECS NHS in care of Crystal Wilder or dropped off at the HS office before February 21st. Senior NHS member; Jocelyn Wyatt states, "We wanted to give back to an organization that works hard to keep animals safe. A little gratitude for all they do for pets with no homes." Senior NHS member; Elsa Woodarek states, "We want to make sure the animals in our area our taken care of and donating to E.A.R.S. will definitely accomplish that!"

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A little about Empire Animal Rescue Society (EARS):

Empire Animal Rescue Society, (EARS), located in Salamanca, N.Y., is a registered 501(c)(3) corporation engaged primarily in the rescue, foster and eventual lifetime placement of companion pets. Other areas of focus include the trap/ neuter/release of feral cats, facilitation of spay and neuter through low-cost clinics, and endorsement of responsible pet ownership through all available means. We are a 100% volunteer, foster based organization. Animals in our care are accepted without regard to breed or severity of need. All aspects of what we do is aimed at reducing the pet overpopulation epidemic and alleviating the suffering that stems from it.

Ears was established in 2011. They work closely with local rescues and other agencies including law enforcement, social services and local dog control officers to meet the needs of animals and people who need assistance. Over 500 spay and neuter surgeries were completed in 2021. They also have a heavy social media presence to highlight pets up for adoption, and a good working relationship with the Seneca Nation of Indians (SNI). They even have established a prison partnership and animal training program called Rescue Under Federal Fences (R.U.F.F.)

EARS also began a partnership with Purrfect Cat Café' in Buffalo, NY in March of 2021. Since then, 200 cats and kittens have been adopted into their forever homes. This location offers 15 cats and kittens at a time a safe space to be fostered and visible to the public as they wait for their new families. The facility allows the animals to roam freely and enjoy the company of the other cats and the people who come in to visit and attend the multiple events they offer including paint nights, private parties, seasonal activities and cat yoga.

PRE-KINDERGARTEN

If you are a parent/guardian of a child turning 4 years old by December 1, 2022 and have interest in enrolling your child in our half-day Pre-K program, please contact Mrs. Kosinski in the Elementary Office at 699-2318, ext. 1600.

Each year, New York State reviews the funding structure for the grant supported Pre-K programs. If our Pre-K program is again funded, acceptance letters for the program will be mailed this June.

The state considers a child pre-school age if their birth date is between December 1, 2017 and November 30, 2018.

In order for your child to be considered for our program, a Pre-K application will need to be filled out and returned to the elementary office.

If you have any questions or need assistance with this application process, please feel free to call the elementary office.

Do you have a child that will be Kindergarten age this fall, but is not currently enrolled in our Pre-K program?

If you do, please notify the Elementary Office at 699-2318, ext. 1600 so we may include your family in any upcoming activities this spring such as Kindergarten Screening.

Our Kindergarten program is a full school day. The state considers a child Kindergarten age if they turn 5 years old before December 1, 2022.

Updates to Reopening Plan and Grants

As this year has progressed, we have seen many changes to the "mandates," guidelines, processes, etc. related to COVID. At times, it seems as if these changes came faster than we could keep up. Sometimes the changes were significant and other times they were minor. At this point, it is necessary to make changes to the ECS Reopening Plan for 2021-22. Please note that the updated plan is still subject to change as we move forward. In fact, as this article is being prepared, we know that changes may be just around the corner; the most notable being possible changes to masking in schools. Despite these pending changes, it is important to make updates to the plan now so that we can make additional changes as necessary. If we wait for all announcements of changes from NYS, the plan would be completely outdated.

While the entire reopening plan can be found on the District Website at: <u>https://</u> <u>www.ellicottvillecentral.com/Page/2221</u>, a summary of the updates include, but are not limited to:

• While we will continue to social distance to the best extent possible, we may not be able to always maintain 6 feet. This includes both classrooms and lunches. At the same time, we will ensure that in classrooms and lunches, at least 3 feet will be maintained.

- We will move study halls and MS/ HS lunches off the HS Stage. Students that had study halls or lunches on the stage will be moved to other locations. To best ensure safety, we will continue to ensure a minimum of 3 feet in these changes. These changes are necessary, as we are now at a point where we need to utilize the stage for chorus, band and the HS Musical.
- As you may be aware, NYS has discontinued its "Contact Tracing" program and modified its quarantine guidelines. In light of this, and for the time being, for elementary students the school will attempt to notify parents (letter and/or robo-call) if their child is identified as a close contact. For MS/HS students, parents of the child testing positive will be asked to have their child notify possible close contacts. Information on quarantining and isolation is located on the Cattaraugus County COVID Website: https://www.cattco.org/coronavirus.

Switching gears, we have made good progress with the CRRSA, ARP-ESSER, and FCC Connectivity grants. In summary, we secured two FCC Grants that will allow us to purchase technology (laptops and iPads) and free up funds in the ARP-ESSER grant to purchase Halo Vape Detectors to curb vaping and improve air quality within the school. Other items of note include, but are not limited to:

- Purchase and installation of 7 water fountains that include bottle filling dispensers.
- The hiring of a third 6th grade teacher.
- The hiring of a MS/HS Transition Teacher
- The purchase and implementation of programs such as "Sources of Strength," a program to better address the social emotional needs of students.
- Please note that the ARP-ESSER Grant actually covers three years, so there is still much work to be done with the funds from this grant. More information about these grants can be found on the District Website at: <u>https://www.ellicottvillecentral.com/</u> <u>domain/241</u>.

ONE SEAT OPEN ON THE ECS BOARD OF EDUCATION:

- Nominating petitions for the Ellicottville Central School District Board of Education are now available. The annual election
 will be held on Tuesday, May 17, 2022 to fill the seat currently held by board member, Mr. Leonard Zlockie. Nominating
 petitions must be filed with the District Clerk by 5:00p.m. on Monday, April 18, 2022.
- Petitions must contain the signatures and legal addresses of at least 25 qualified voters living in the Ellicottville Central School District. A qualified voter must be a United States citizen, be at least 18 years of age, a district resident for 30 days prior to the election, with their current address on the nominating petition. To qualify as a candidate, one must be a qualified voter and a district resident for one year immediately prior to the election.
- The candidate (one) receiving the highest number of votes will serve a five-year term, beginning on July 1, 2022 and expiring on June 30, 2027.
- Nominating petitions are available in the District Office, between the hours of 8:00 a.m. 4:00 p.m. (Monday-Friday) when school is in session.
