
ESC was in full swing during the month of December!

Two-Hour Delays



Please be assured that if the weather is severe enough, the District will not hesitate to close for the entire day as the safety of students and staff is our first priority.



Requests for transportation of non-public school children should be submitted to the Ellicottville Central School District Superintendent's Office **prior to April 1, 2020**.

Regulations require that the district transport students to nonpublic schools when a student resides within 15 miles of the non-public school. The 15 miles is measured from the home of the student to the non-public school.

Looking Forward at ECS

I would like to start out by saying THANK YOU to the community for its support in approving the Capital Improvement Project (CIP). Your commitment to ECS will allow the school to continue to provide a superior educational experience to students in a safe and modern environment! It is surely going to be an exciting time as we work through the various stages of the CIP. As the school moves forward, we will keep you posted of our progress through the newsletter as well as our website.

The next step of the process is the design stage. Throughout the remainder of the school year and into the summer, meetings will be held at regular intervals with the architects, construction managers, consultants and representatives from the school. These meetings will allow us to focus on the details of each area of the project in order to finalize plans that will be submitted to the New York State Education Department for approval.

On a different note, we are in the process of building the 2020-21 budget. Currently, the process is proving to be a bit more daunting this year. I say this because, while we have received our estimated "State Aid Runs," the look of this report has changed. In the past, there were a number of different categories that districts had learned how to track to determine where we were receiving aid and how it could be used. This year, the Governor, is combining 10 different categories (including foundation aid, previously the largest, most unrestricted category of aid) into one category and calling it all Foundation Aid. While this appears to give us greater latitude in how we may use the funds, my understanding is that it removes predictability for the future, and increases in foundation aid would be subject to new formulas every year. The good news is that Foundation Aid across the state has been increased. The bad news is that building aid across the state is down (building aid is a categorical aid).

At the current time, we at ECS are working hard to determine what all of this means for the District. While we anticipate slight increases in a couple of aid categories, overall, the report has us receiving <u>less</u> aid than last year, <u>and</u> the tax cap will be 1.81% (which is <u>down</u> from 2%). Given these initial figures and parameters, it will, indeed, be a challenge to create the 2020-21 budget. However, please know that we at ECS are tackling this challenge head on. We are working diligently with our financial advisor, attending webinars provided by the New York State Council of School Superintendents (NYSOCSS) and the New York State School Boards Association (NYSSBA), and participating in meetings with NYS Assemblyman Joe Giglio and NYS Senator George Borello to express our concerns and frustrations. It is important to keep in mind the Legislature can make changes with enough votes to change amounts, restore formulas, etc. as it has done in the past. Please be assured that we are committed to staying on top of these changes and how they will impact the 2020-21 budget development. We will strive to keep you informed as we put together a fiscally responsible plan.

Moving to a different topic, you may be hearing about "Ed Law 2d." This is a new law in New York State (NYS) that will require districts to implement policies, plans, forms and contracts with vendors to best ensure that Personal Identifiable Information (PII) of students is not inappropriately accessed by groups outside of the school. Over the next few months you will start hearing more about this. Please know that we are already taking steps to ensure that we not only comply with the requirements of NYS, but that, more importantly, we will work hard to protect the identity of students in today's digital age.

PRE-KINDERGARTEN:

If your son or daughter will be turning 4 years old by Dec. 1, 2020, please call the Elementary Office. We will then mail you a planning paperwork packet that will need to be completed and returned to the Elementary Office. Each year New York State reviews the funding structure for the grant supported Pre-K programs. Our Pre-K program is a half day program. If our Pre-K program is again funded, acceptance letters for the program will be mailed this June. The state considers a child Pre-school age if their birth date is between December 1, 2015 and November 30, 2016. Please contact the Elementary Office at 699-2318 (ext. 1600) as we will be happy to answer any questions that you have at this time.

KINDERGARTEN:

Do you have a child that will be Kindergarten age this fall, but is not currently enrolled in our Pre-K program? **Please notify the Elementary Office at 699-2318** (ext. 1600) so we may include your family in some upcoming activities this spring such as Kindergarten Screening and the annual Pre-K picnic. Our Kindergarten program is a full school day. The state considers a child Kindergarten age if they turn 5 years old before December 1, 2020.

Are my kids getting enough physical activity?

You know kids need physical activity to grow up strong and healthy.

But did you know it can help them feel better right away?







PARENTS

And when your kids are feeling good, your life is easier, too. So find ways to help your kids fit more activity into their day.

How much do they need?

Kids and teens ages 6 to 17 need at least **60 minutes** every day.

Most of it can be **moderate-intensity aerobic activity**. Anything that gets their heart beating faster counts.





At least 3 days a week, encourage your kids to step it up to **vigorous-intensity aerobic activity.**



Is it moderate or vigorous? Use the "talk test" to find out.

When you're being active, try talking:

- If you're breathing hard but can still have a conversation easily, it's moderate-intensity activity
- If you can only say a few words before you have to take a breath, it's vigorous-intensity activity

As part of their daily 60 minutes, kids and teens also need:

Muscle-strengthening activity

At least 3 days a week



Anything that makes their muscles work harder counts — like climbing or swinging on the monkey bars. **Bone-strengthening activity** At least 3 days a week



Bones need pressure to get stronger. Running, jumping, and other weight-bearing activities all count.

My kids are younger than 6. What about them?

Younger kids love to be active naturally!

- Aim to keep them moving 3 hours a day and more is better
- Limit time when they're just sitting around (like screen time)



Whatever gets them moving!



Encourage active play with friends



Give them rewards for active chores



Sign them up for free or low-cost sports or classes

Or get active together!



Make your morning walks a race



Dance while dinner's in the oven



Show them your favorite ways to move

Most of all, help them find activities they really like to do!

It all adds up. And so do the benefits.

Help them get active now, and they'll build healthy habits for life. So take the first step. Get your kids moving. And when you can, move with them!
