TWO SEATS OPEN ON THE ELLICOTTVILLE CENTRAL SCHOOL BOARD OF EDUCATION

Nominating petitions for the Ellicottville Central School District Board of Education are now available. The annual election will be held on Tuesday, May 16, 2023 to fill the seats currently held by board members, Mr. William Murphy and Mrs. Debra Colley. Nominating petitions must be filed with the District Clerk by 5:00 p.m. on Monday, April 17, 2023.

Petitions must contain the signatures and legal addresses of at least 25 qualified voters living in the Ellicottville Central School District. A qualified voter must be a United States citizen, be at least 18 years of age, a district resident for 30 days prior to the election, with their current address on the nominating petition. To qualify as a candidate, one must be a qualified voter and a district resident for one year immediately prior to the election.

The candidates (two) receiving the highest number of votes will each serve a five-year term, beginning on July 1, 2023 and expiring on June 30, 2028.

Nominating petitions are available in the District Office, between the hours of 8:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. (Monday-Friday) when school is in session.

anuary not only brings us the "New Year," it also signifies the half-way point of the school year as, January 30, 2023 is the beginning of the 2nd Semester.

Resolutions:

Instead of talking about "New Year's Resolutions," I would like to talk about 2nd Semester Resolutions/Goals for students. I'm not thinking about complicated or unattainable resolutions, but, rather small changes students can make to improve or broaden their horizons. Some examples could be: signing up for a challenging class in high school, making new friends, joining a club or participating in a different activity, reading more books, etc. Some students could make resolutions (or set goals) to: improve their grades, work on better attendance, or making it to school on time. As a District, we stand ready to help students (and parents) with some of these resolutions and/or goals. Parents can encourage their child/children to talk to teachers, counselors, coaches, principals, etc., or parents can reach out directly to staff.

Moving beyond COVID:

I'm happy to report that we continue to move away from the restrictive measures that we needed to take in the previous 2 years as a result of the COVID 19 Pandemic. While we continue to move farther away from the many COVID restrictions / precautions, we also need to return to some of the items that are considered normal. This year, all students will be required to take applicable NYS Assessments. For some this will mean the 3-8 Math and ELA Assessments and the 8th Grade Science Assessment. For HS students, this means all the Regents will be given in June.

It also means we need to return to many of the school rules that were modified or "suspended"

during the Pandemic. Currently, the rules around attendance in the MS/HS will take precedence. During the Pandemic we "bent" the rules a little with respect to attendance. It allowed for better social distancing, smaller classes, and avoiding students sitting in big, long study halls due to nuances in schedules. Starting with the 2nd semester, we will return to following the Attendance Policy much closer, which reads:

To be able to practice, participate and/or attend any extra-curricular or after school activity, students must sign into school by 9 a.m. and remain in attendance, following their regular schedule for the remainder of the day. This includes Fridays, in order to participate in weekend activities. Extenuating circumstances will require PRIOR administrative approval.

Please note: very similar language is also in the Athletic and Extracurricular Policies.

In addition, the Student Agenda reads:

School officially starts with the ringing of the 8:10 a.m. bell and continues through 2:55 p.m. ALL students are expected to be in attendance during these hours for ALL classes. Students WILL NOT BE ALLOWED to report to school late if they have a 1st period study hall or leave early if they have a study hall last period. Students that leave early without appropriate parent/guardian permission will be subject to appropriate consequences. NO student can sign himself/herself out without parent/guardian permission (either in writing, via a phone call between the main office and the parent/guardian or an entry in the Pick Up Patrol app).

I also need to point out that Administration is currently also looking into and will be meeting with the senior class to discuss possible senior privileges which may or may not impact the information above.

Parents we really need and appreciate your

help as we return to attendance rules as outlined in our polices. Our intent is to ensure students receive the instruction they need, have access to supports within the school, fill their schedules with challenging and meaningful classes, arrive to school on-time, and better ensure safety (i.e. often times road conditions are not really safe when students try to sign out and then return at lunchtime).

A more comprehensive letter will be mailed to parents regarding attendance procedures in the near future.

2023-24 School Budget:

While we have started working on next year's budget, at the current time, we really do not have a reliable estimate on our increase in aid from NYS (which we have usually received by now). The estimated increases in foundation aid we have seen are as low as 0% and as high as 3%. At the same time, we have been told about increases in insurance, utilities, inflation for many of the materials/supplies we need, etc. Given this lack of information, it is really not prudent to discuss next year's budget in depth at this time, including how all of this will impact taxes. We are hoping to get more accurate numbers in the very near future so we can proceed accordingly with planning. We will have more information to share with you in the upcoming newsletter.

As we continue into the New Year and the 2nd Semester, my hope is that we will all find ways to challenge ourselves to improve, stay healthy, be happy, and prosper.



PRE-K AND KINDERGARTEN SCREENING

PRE-KINDERGARTEN

If you are a parent/guardian of a child turning 4 years old by December 1, 2023 and have interest in enrolling your child in our half-day Pre-K program, please contact Mrs. Kosinski in the Elementary Office at 699-2318, ext. 1600.

Each year, New York State reviews the funding structure for the grant supported Pre-K programs. If our Pre-K program is again funded the district will notify you by mail.

The state considers a child pre-school age if their birth date is between December 1, 2018 and November 30, 2019.

In order for your child to be considered for our program, a Pre-K application will need to be filled out and returned to the elementary office.

If you have any questions or need assistance with this application process, please feel free to call the elementary office.

KINDERGARTEN

Do you have a child that will be Kindergarten age this fall, but is not currently enrolled in our Pre-K program? Please notify the Elementary Office at 699-2318, ext. 1600 so we may include

your family in any upcoming activities this spring such as Kindergarten Screening. Our Kindergarten program is a full school day. The state considers a child Kindergarten age if they turn 5 years old before December 1, 2023.
