ECS Teams Click In Competition

The Ellicottville Robotics team competed in the qualifying round of the First Lego League Into Orbit challenge at Houghton College. The competition consists of three parts. The robot challenge, the project, and core values. This year's topic was Into Orbit. Each team had

to identify a human or social problem faced during long duration space explorations within our Sun's solar system and propose a solution. The robot part

challenges teams to build and program a robot to complete as many missions as they can in 2 minutes and 30 seconds. The core values judges how the team members work together.

Twenty Five teams from the region competed at the competition. Ellicottville sent three teams to compete this year. The **DISCO BRICKS** team of David Thompson, Gabrielle Spross, Aiden Harrington, Samuel Edwards, Brooke Butler, Aaron LoGiudice, and Christopher Edwards came in 2nd in the robot challenge and finished **1st overall** for the day, taking home the grand champion trophy.

The **FUZZY LOGIC** team of Tobias Coburn, Liam McGuire, Jayce Pearl, Sophia Sundeen, Kyle Robinson, and Benjamin Edwards won the Judges Award and finished 3rd in the robot challenge and **3rd overall** for the day.

The **GALILEGO** team of Bryce Wood, Alex Silvernail, William Benatovich, Mason Perks, Nathan Andrews, Christopher Calarco, and Skye Wood won the robot design award and finished **5th overall** for the day.

All three teams advanced to the next round held at the University of Rochester!

Changes For a Safer School...Part 2



This article is the second of a series that will be in the newsletters this year. The purpose of these articles will be to notify you of important changes that we will be making in order to better ensure student safety. Some of these changes may not be convenient, but we must always keep in mind that student safety outweighs convenience.

Last month we changed the arrival procedures for students, and the transition for these changes went smoothly and without incident. Thank you so much for your cooperation as we made these changes; it is truly appreciated. Our next procedural changes will take effect on Wednesday, January 2, 2019. These changes will have to do with how parents and visitors access the building during the school day, and how students are signed out.

Starting 1/2/19, when a parent or visitor "buzzes" into the office, if the individual answering the buzzer does not recognize them, they will be asked to state their name and reason for asking to enter the building. I would ask that parents and visitors be patient as we have different people in the offices at different times, and the person "on duty" at the time of your arrival may not recognize you.

Keeping this thought in mind, the individual "on duty" in the office may not know a parent or visitor who is asking to sign a student out of the school. If this is the case, you will be asked to show some form of photo identification. Please know that this is not an attempt to be difficult; it is a step to best ensure the safety of our students. If a person attempting to sign a student out is not on our official emergency contact list (as submitted by parents) or does not have express written permission from the parent, the student may not be allowed to be signed out. In these cases, the person working in the office may ask you to wait while she/he contacts an administrator to assist with the situation.

Again, this is our attempt to take all steps to best ensure the safety of our students.

On a different note, I would ask the high school students that drive to be mindful of not only their speed entering and exiting the school and parking lots, but they also remember that the winter elements of snow and ice mean they should be extra cautious. Parents, I ask that you please assist with reminders.

And, while we cover bus safety in the first newsletter each year, I feel it is only prudent to remind everyone to be extra aware of stopped school busses. Unfortunately, we have had a number of cars pass school busses picking up and/or dropping off students at homes. Passing a bus with its red flashing lights on is illegal and carries hefty fines. But, more importantly, passing a bus with the red flashing lights on, places students at high risk for injury; especially our youngest students that are not always aware of all their surroundings.



got better as the season went on. Maddox Bush was named as the Team MVP and honorable mention by the Chautauqua/ Cattaraugus Athletic Association. Great season!




Girls' Varsity Volleyball
