In addition, the student must complete twenty-five hours of tutoring. This is a lot of work on top of an already busy schedule. Congratulations James!!


ECS BAND TAKES TOP PRIZE AT MUSIC FESTIVAL

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



"I love New York Agriculture"

I interviewed my parents about the history of New York Agriculture. My mother and father grew up on a farm. My mother grew up on a vegetable farm. My father grew up on a dairy farm. Farming has been in my family for more than 3 generations.

On my dad's side, in the early 1900's, my great grandfather purchased a farm in Ellicottville, New York. In the early years cows were milked by hand. Field work was done by horses. He started with a couple of cows and worked up to 15-20 cows. To earn income for the farm, they bottled and sold raw milk. They sold milk to residents in the village. They delivered the milk by horse and wagon. Later they would ship their milk in cans that they delivered to the milk plant in town. At that time they switched from milking by hand to milking with machines and using more modern equipment. They went from stacking loose hay in a pile to baling hay and putting it in a barn. By 1950 my grandfather ran the farm and then modernized even more with milk being picked up at the farm by a big milk truck out of the big bulk tank in the milk house. He continued to produce milk until 1980 when he sold all of his milk cows. He raised heifers after that. In the mid 1980's my dad purchased what my grandfather had and that is how he got started. We keep the calves and heifers at our house. Our cows are kept at a friend of ours.

On my mom's side, in 1960, my great grandfather sold his dairy cows. He then began to grow fruits and vegetables at a roadside stand. They sold flowers in the spring, fruits and vegetables all summer, peaches and tomatoes for canning and pumpkins in the fall. They provided food for their family as well as providing local produce for their community. My great grandparents produced local produce for almost 30 years.

We promote New York State Agriculture by exhibiting registered Jerseys at Cattaraugus and Erie County Fairs. Visitors at the fair come and ask me questions they have about the animals. I answer their questions. We set up a display at the fair. It shows visitors about our animals and the hard work we put into the agricultural program. Agriculture is where we get most of our food. Agriculture is important. Without it we wouldn't survive.

ECS CAFETERIA IS BACK IN THE BLACK!

Historically, the school cafeteria has seldom finished the year in the black. In fact, over the past nine years it has been in the red every year. By the end of 2009-2010, the Cafeteria Fund owed the school's General Fund \$200,729. The Board used District reserve funds in June 2010 to "pay off the debt". It was at that time that the Board and administration made it clear that major steps would have to be taken in order to get the cafeteria in the black. Failure to do so, would likely lead to the District considering other options with the possibility of contracting with an outside vendor.

On top of our own financial concerns the District is facing new Federal Guidelines that require such things as: all wheat bread, 90% wheat pasta, fresh fruit daily, increase fresh vegetables and increased portion sizes which all add extra cost.

After having an independent review of the cafeteria operation, Vicky Williams, Cafeteria Manager, and Superintendent Ward developed a plan to address the financial issues facing the cafeteria. The following steps were taken:

- > Reduction of one part-time position
- > Reduction in the hours of some employees
- > Reduction in the Cafeteria Manager's salary
- Increased the price of meals and ala carte items
- ➤ K-12 breakfast only served in elementary cafeteria
- ➤ Installation of our own vending machine with healthy snacks

As we close in on the end of the 2011-12, we are pleased and excited to report that we are projecting to finish the year in the "black"! This is really an unbelievable accomplishment given the fact we finished in the red for nine straight years and lost nearly \$54,000 last year. It is certainly a tribute to the staff and Mrs. Williams leadership to turn this operation around.

Mr. Ward added, "due to the countless state and federal requirements that we are governed by, it makes it increasingly difficult to break even. We continue to be very proud of the quality of our food and the people who prepare and serve it to our students."
