Eighth grade students completed an extensive unit studying the Holocaust and Anne Frank. This unit involved research of the Holocaust, reading Holocaust related novels, researching the truth of Anne Frank's story, reading the play based on Anne Frank's Diary by Frances Goodrich and Albert Hackett, and researching Anne Frank's betrayer. Throughout this unit, students created a poster based on research of their assigned Holocaust term, explored the Anne Frank museum in Amsterdam via the internet, and wrote an argument essay as to who betrayed Anne Frank and her family based on research shown through Discovery Education.

Due to this extensive research, students were quite knowledgeable on the topic for The Holocaust Resource Center of Buffalo's Annual Writing and Arts competition. This year's theme was
"Stand Up - Don’t Stand By." Students were able to write a piece of prose which displayed the impact of the bystander during the Holocaust and how that knowledge influences their actions in today's global society. This theme was a perfect fit, not only because of the unit of study, but it also tied into our school's character education focus for the year. All students did very well on this assignment for English class, and ninety percent of the eighth grade students' writing was entered into the competition, which included all Western New York School Districts.

She attended a special presentation of this award on Thursday, May $29^{\text {th }}$. ## Winning Writers Capture Second Place

Each year, students in ninth through twelfth grade from Cattaraugus and Allegany Counties are chosen by their English teachers to compete in the annual Angelo Melaro Writing Contest, a prestigious competition for high school students which test their ability to write on demand. The students are given a prompt, and then asked to write an essay in ninety minutes.

This year the ECS students who participated were Emma Chew ( $9^{\text {th }}$ grade), Elijah DeChane ( $10^{\text {th }}$ grade), Finn Wilson ( $11^{\text {th }}$ grade), and Mckenzie Robinson ( $12^{\text {th }}$ grade). The prompt for the $9^{\text {th }}$ and $10^{\text {th }}$ graders was, "In the Kite Runner, Rahim Khan tells Amir, "There is a way to be good again." Provide 2 literary examples to demonstrate the truth to this statement. Explain how these examples are different yet yield the same result." The prompt for the $11^{\text {th }}$ and $12^{\text {th }}$ graders was, "A thread runs through all things: all worlds are strung on it as beads: and men, and events, and life, come to us, only because of that thread." Explain what Emerson means and whether or not you agree with him. Provide one example from history and one

from literature to support your argument."
Students wrote the essays in a computer lab at the school, and then the English teachers in area school districts reviewed and scored them. On March $27^{\text {th }}$, all participants came together for a luncheon at the Olean BOCES center where the
winners were announced. All the writers did very well, and Emma and Finn both placed in their grade levels (Emma placed $3^{\text {rd }}$, and Finn placed $2^{\text {nd }}$ ). Ellicottville also won second place overall as a team, an award which is calculated using the points awarded to all four essays.

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## Reminders from the School Health Office

## End-of-Year Medication Pick-Up Information

All medications brought into school must be picked up at the end of the school year. Unless your child has current permission to self-carry their medication, the school is not able to allow your child to bring the medication home themselves. If you need to make special arrangements to pick up medication, please call to make arrangements. New York State regulations require that all medication left at school at the end of the school year be discarded. This includes inhalers and Epi-pens. Medications not picked up 2 weeks after the end of school will be discarded.

## Information for Medications Needed at School

 New York State Law requires that:- New medication forms for both prescription and over-thecounter (OTC) medications must be signed by the provider and parent annually. Orders are good for one year from the date they are written.
- The parent must sign the medication permission form.
- Medication must remain in the properly labeled pharmacy or original OTC container.
- Parents or guardians must personally deliver all medication to the school health office (unless a self-carry order form is signed by parent and physician).
- If your child's provider has determined that your child may self-carry and self-administer their medication, please have your healthcare provider complete the appropriate portion of the medication form which requires provider consent.
Parent signature is also required.
We request that you ask your pharmacist to give you a second identically labeled container for any prescription medications your student will take at school. We also request that you bring small containers of any OTC medications that your student will take. This will allow the School Nurse to send these medications on field trips and comply with New York State laws pertaining to medication storage. Medication forms are available on the district web site or may be obtained from the school health office. Your physician may use their own form if desired.

## 2014-2015 Health Examination Requirements

New York State law requires that all new entrants (whether Pre-K or K), 2nd, 4th, 7th, \& 10th graders, and all students entering a school district for the first time have a health examination by a New York State licensed provider. This examination must be provided to school within 30 days of entry into school or the grade levels indicated above.

Acceptable health certificates may be dated anytime within the 12 months prior to the start of the 2014-2015 School Year. We recommend that this examination be made by your family health care provider who knows your child best. If a copy of the health examination is not on file within 30 days, you will be notified by the school administrator.

Please fill out a parental permission form authorization for use or disclosure of protected health information (HIPAA) to allow
coordinated care and communication between your health care provider and the school nurse.

Please return these forms to the health office. If your child has a physical scheduled during the school year, please notify the Health Office with the date of the scheduled physical exam. If you have any questions, please call the Health Office at 6992318. Your physician may also fax the physical to 699-5635.

Please be aware that there are new New York State Immunization requirements for all students. Please call your physician's office to ensure your child is up to date on immunizations.

## Important Sports Clearance Information

A complete physical exam which is signed by a licensed practitioner is required before any participation, including practices, are allowed. The results of the physical are valid for a period of 12 months through the last day of the month in which the physical was conducted, unless there is a change in the student's health status following the physical exam.

Other requirements are:

1. A new "Interval Health History" form must be completed and signed by a parent or guardian each time a student participates in any sport. All forms are available in the nurse's office or main office, as well as on the districts website under the school nurse and athletics. Concussion information will be on the back of all Interval Health History forms.
2. Students who have been injured or had an extended illness or absence since their last physical exam will need updated physician clearance for sports participation.
3. The school nurse must sign the Interval Health History forms before a student is allowed to practice or play. The school nurse will not sign the Interval Health History form unless all information is up to date and the student is completely cleared by a physician.
4. It is recommended that students use their own private health care provider for physicals. If you are unable to have a physical performed by your private provider, the school medical director can provide a physical for your child. Please alert the school nurse if your child needs a physical performed at school.
5. An updated action plan for students who have asthma or an emergency care plan for students who have life-threatening conditions must be filled out. You can find these plans on the school nurse website or the nurse's office.

## Notice for Fall 2014 Sports

The school nurse will be available August 4th through August 8th, 2014 from 8am until 3pm for students to come in to have their Interim Health Histories signed. Please be sure to have all of the forms mentioned above filled out and bring them with you to meet with the nurse. The school doctor will be available for anyone who may need an updated physical on August $6^{\text {th }}$ from 8 am until 3pm.
