


Set Sail with 'South Pacific' April 4th & 5th

District Budgeting: A Six-Year Snapshot

The Board is beginning to look at the "numbers" and establishing some parameters and priorities within the choices we are facing. This article will provide you with a snapshot of the steps we have taken over the past five years to maintain quality programs, stabilize costs and continue to produce solid State testing results.

STAFFING

From 2008 to 2014 we have trimmed, right sized and adjusted every aspect of the school operation. We have trimmed the teaching staff by 6.8 positions including the local staff and professional staff employed by the Cattaraugus/Allegany BOCES. In some situations, we have added positions and in others we have reduced in an effort to adjust staffing appropriately. In reviewing our support staff we have made changes in every area of the District operation. The staff has been reduced by a total of 12 positions while increasing part-time positions from 4 to 7.

SPENDING

Since 2009 the Board and administration have worked hard to contain costs, reduce spending and keep tax increases responsible. The Ellicottville School District already has the lowest tax rate in Western New York (under \$8.00 on \$1,000 of assessed property). When compared to neighboring districts our school taxes are two and three times less for property of similar value. The chart below reflects how we have stabilized the budget and spending. We are projecting to spend less in 2013-14 than we did in 2008-09!

The lower chart really tells the story of the massive decrease in state aid that our school has endured over the last five years. Since the Gap Elimination Adjustment (GEA) was implemented in 2010-11, the district has lost \$1,783,321 in state aid that was subtracted from what we were originally projected to receive. The GEA reduction has resulted in a 10% loss of state aid since 2010-11. In order to make up the difference the District has used substantial reserves to bridge the gap, keep taxes manageable, make improvements and repairs as needed and maintain programs and opportunities.

MAINTAINING QUALITY PROGRAMS

With the loss of state aid that we have endured over the past five years it has forced us to look at every aspect of the school operation in an effort to economize and right size. We have taken a number of steps already pointed out in this article in an effort to continue to offer a quality education.

Based on state testing in grades 3-8 as well as Regents testing, Business First has ranked ECS #1 academically for the past two years in Cattaraugus and Allegany County. Over the last two years our elementary has ranked 23 and 40 out of 281 schools while our Middle School has climbed from 78 to 64 out of 208 schools. The high school remains steady going up two slots to 54 out of 135 other high schools in WNY. We also have the most experienced teaching staff in WNY (85.6% have more than a decade of experience in the classroom)! The collective efforts of our students and staff with parents who value education and a community who supports our school system make us a winning combination!

We are very proud of how our students and teachers have performed and we want to maintain the excellence that is associated with the school district. In order to do this we must continue to provide the students and staff with the resources, experiences and opportunities they need to prepare them for the academic challenges of college or make sure graduates have the skills they will need to successfully enter the work force.

Financial Update on the Capital Project

Currently, we are in the "hurry up and wait" phase of our Capital Project while the plans are in Albany awaiting review. The process is somewhat long and can be frustrating, but that is the way it works. There are two areas of review that a project goes through: Architectural and Engineering. As projects proceed through the State Education Department pipeline it is difficult to predict when our project will come up for review in the two separate areas. The scope and size of projects filed before us will impact the length of time the review process will take for those projects ahead of us.

As we talk about bids for the project, we are authorized by the voters for a project that cannot exceed \$9,845,800. The District's share of the project has not

changed...the state will provide 65.1% of the cost of the project that is eligible for aid and the District will cover the remaining cost. The estimated increase in school taxes to fund the project has not changed. We originally projected that roughly 88% of the project would be aidable but that number has now gone up to nearly 93%! There is another factor that will also impact the final number and that is the bond rate that we will lock in when we finalize the borrowing for the project. The rates continue to be very favorable so this is also a plus for the District.

As a conceptual project is developed into bricks, blocks, steel, plumbing, electrical and finishes, you have to be prepared to give and take on some aspects. Will we be able to get everything we want in the project? At this time, there is no way of knowing. However, we have to set up

the bidding process in a way that "protects" the core elements of the project and insures we will be able to get those things the community approved. Therefore, we will establish a base bid package that will include the "core elements" of the project and then we will have a list of alternates that will have items that we hope to be able to get. If the base bid comes in good, then it is quite likely we would get many of the alternates.

We plan to phase in funding of the project over the next two years, with the District projected to start receiving state aid during the 2015-16 school year. The plan calls for adding \$240,000 to the budget in 2014-15 and the remaining \$127,000 in 2015-16. Once the initial payments are made, the amount of the payment will not change for the duration of the 16-year maturity of the bonds.





From the Nurse: ECS Concussion Protocol

Concussion Protocol for ECS:

- If head injury takes place, the student/athlete will be removed immediately from play or activity for the rest of the game or practice. "When in doubt, sit them out"
- Student/athlete will be assessed for signs/symptoms of concussion.
- Any positive emergent signs/symptoms student should be referred at once for emergency medical care (confusion, dizziness, vision problems, unusual behavior or responsiveness, deteriorating condition, loss of consciousness, or concern about neck and spine injury).
- If no emergency is apparent remove from play for rest of day (monitor every 5-10 minutes for at least 30 minutes) and have student see medical provider.
- ANY head injury will be reported to parents.
- Once cleared by primary care physician (student to be symptom free for 7 days):
 - School Nurse to assess student for any lingering signs or symptoms of concussion.
 - School Nurse to fax clearance, along with her findings, to school's Medical Director for review and final clearance (as per District Policy).
 - If cleared, student to follow "Return to Play" Protocol (see below)

<u>International Consensus Conference Guidelines</u> for Return to Play Following Head Injury/Concussion:

- **Phase 1** low impact non-strenuous light aerobic activity for short intervals, such as easy walking, biking, swimming in three ten minute intervals with rest in between; no resistance training
- Phase 2 higher impact, higher exertion activity in two 15

- minute intervals, with rest in between, such as running/ jumping rope, skating, or other cardio exercise; may be sports specific if available (e.g. skating without collision meaning suited up, but skating when the team is not doing drills; running without impact in soccer or football, suited up), no resistance training
- Phase 3 repeat phase 2 progressing with shorter breaks, and add additional 10 to 15 min. stationary skill work, such as dribbling, serving, tossing a ball (balls should not be thrown or kicked in the direction of the student); low resistance training if available with spotting
- Phase 4 repeat of phase 3 without breaks in cardio, but add skill work with movement (allowing balls to be thrown/kicked in the direction of student) and add additional 10-15 minutes; non-contact training drills. Student will complete post-injury ImPACTcomputer-based neuro-cognitive testing to compare with baseline pre-injury test results in combination with the athlete's current overall neuro-cognitive symptoms and physical presentation. Collaboration between the ATC, RN, District Physician and/or NP, and private medical provider, as needed, will determine whether to advance, hold, or regress.
- Phase 5 repeat phase 4 as a warm up; weight lifting with spotting; full contact training drills for full practice session
- Phase 6 warm up followed by full participation as tolerated

NOTE:

- Student/athlete must remain asymptomatic to progress to the next phase.
- If symptoms return, the student/athlete must return to the previous phase.
- Medical check should occur before contact.
