## Common Core Curriculum: What does it mean?

As we begin to implement the Common Core Math Curriculum across K-8, students are being asked to focus more deeply on fewer topics. Integrated Algebra I has also changed with a new Regents being introduced in June 2014 that is part of the new Common Core Curriculum. This is a dramatic shift in instruction as well as the curriculum that is being taught at each grade level. Parents are finding that the work is more demanding and rigorous, and, in some instances, they are unable to help their children with their homework.

The Common Core Curriculum refers to English as well as math instruction and we have been introducing changes in both areas during the past two school years. The Common Core State Standards are important because they will help all children - no matter who they are - learn the same skills. They create clear expectations for what your child should know and be able to do in key areas: reading, writing, speaking and listening, language and mathematics. If you know what these expectations are, then you can work with the teacher and help your child prepare.

On top of that, students are being asked to explain what they did. In other
words, the simple math answer is no longer "good enough"... students must be able to apply critical thinking skills to real world problem solving.

The depth of instruction is now far more important than covering a variety of topics each year and building on the learning. Rather than memorizing information, taking multiple-choice tests or repeating what they are given, $21^{\text {st }}$ century learning requires that students are taught to be thinkers. We need our students to be engaged (active learners) in the learning process and be able to apply learning to real world events. Students need to fully understand the concepts and master the skills to a far greater level than ever before. Ultimately, the true focus of the new Common Core Curriculum is to make sure our students are career and college ready when they graduate from high school.

The quality of our teaching staff is the number one key to the successful implementation of the Common Core Curriculum that you are hearing so much about. Our school has been preparing for this and the 2012-13 testing results demonstrated that the overall District performance was far above the state results and area districts in the three county area. Assessments have
been part of grades 4-8 for over ten years and the new APPR has added additional assessments in all subjects and courses so there is a heightened emphasis on student achievement and growth.

Throughout the year, elementary teachers will be sending home weekly updates with information that will help parents better understand the new curriculum and how they can help their child. I also encourage parents to take time to browse though the EngageNY.org website to read the latest information on the instructional and curriculum changes that are taking place. We have provided a link on our District website to access this site.

While there has been a lot of media hype over the rollout of the Common Core, be assured that ECS teachers have been preparing to make the necessary curriculum changes. We owe it to our children to make sure they are in a position to meet the challenges of the world they will live and work in. The world has changed and it requires us to look differently at how we approach the teaching-learning process. We must produce students who can step into jobs (career ready), or enter college prepared to be successful at the freshman level.


# Capital Project Proceeding on Schedule

Our Capital Project continues to proceed on schedule with the filing of the "plans" to the State Education Department (SED) on October 30, 2013. This is the next major step in the process that will impact when we will actually be able to break ground.

These plans include the following building additions and renovations: electrical, mechanical, plumbing, heating and ventilation; and the overall general construction that the project will encompass. The plan also includes cost estimates for the various components of the project.

The SED officials will review all of the information over the next five/six months. Once we receive project approval, we plan to release bids in April or May with actual construction starting in June 2014. Now that our plans are in Albany, we "must wait our turn" with the SED officials at the Office of Facilities Planning.

Since the project was originally passed, we have better defined the scope of the work and what to expect. It gets even more exciting when you start to look at the many improvements that we are making. Here is a sneak peak on what to expect!
4. There will be 375 seats of movable bleachers in the multiuse facility, with nearly 300 having padded seats and backs
4 The 3 -section bleachers can be moved closer to the stage for performances
7 A new concession stand will be built inside the cafeteria

* A new entrance vestibule will be constructed at the High

School parking lot entrance ( $16^{\prime} 6^{\prime \prime} \times 15$ ')
\& Demolition of the existing gym will be the first order of business in June 2014
7 New construction of the gym and locker rooms will start in the early fall of 2014
7 Glass walls will be incorporated into the weight room and the new hallway
4. New wall finishes will be made in all the corridors

* New lockers and corridor work in the 1962 section of the building will take place in the summer of 2015
Y Band and chorus rooms will have sky lights

4. High School foyer will have a new look incorporating lights, glass and new blocks
5. Heating and ventilation issues in the elementary will be addressed
Y Football/soccer field will be shifted south with two additional poles installed with modern new lighting increasing candlepower to 50 (presently it is 3-12)
च 10 older classrooms will be remodeled in the summer of 2015
Y Roof work will be split over the summers of 2014 and 2015

* New lighting will be provided in the parking lots and in front of the elementary building

4. The multi-use facility will have a control room built above the bleachers

## Needs Assessment: Keeping Students Healthy and Safe

ECS has been selected to participate in the Prevention Needs Assessment. This survey of $9^{\text {th }}-12^{\text {th }}$ graders is designed to improve our understanding of our children's strengths and the risks they may face for problems like smoking, underage drinking and drug use. Surveys will take place the week of November 18th. The information the students provide can help us all take steps to reduce and prevent these problems. The survey is sponsored by the New York State Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services.

The following are facts about the survey:

1. It is totally voluntary. Your child does not have to participate. You do not have to give a reason for not participating. Students are not required to answer all questions, only those that they want to answer.
2. It is anonymous. The survey is designed to protect your child's and your school's privacy. No names or any other identifying information will ever be recorded. All of the surveys are carefully protected.
3. ECS and the Cattaraugus County Council on Addiction and Recovery Services (CAReS) will use the school survey results to plan better prevention efforts.
4. The Prevention Needs Assessment has been scientifically tested and is valid and reliable. Developed in 1995, it has been given to over 100,000 students in schools across the United States without difficulty.

If you do not want your child to participate, simply send a note or call the high school office at 699-2316 by November 12th. Your child will be given an alternative activity to do during the survey period.

## Seasonal Flu: A Guide for Parents

Is seasonal flu more serious
for kids?

> Flu vaccine may save your child's life.

Infants and young children are at a greater risk for getting seriously ill from the flu. That's why the New York State Department of Health recommends that all children 6 months and older get the seasonal flu vaccine.

Most people with seasonal flu are sick for about a week, and then they feel better. But, some people, especially young children, pregnant women, older people, and people with chronic health problems can get very sick. Some can even die.
A flu vaccine is the best way to protect your child from seasonal flu. It is recommended for everyone 6 months and older.

The flu, or influenza, is an infection of the nose, throat, and lungs. The flu can spread from person to person.

- Flu shots can be given to children 6 months and older.
- A nasal-spray vaccine can be given to healthy children 2 years and older.
- Children younger than 5 years who have experienced wheezing in the past year - or any child with chronic health problems - should get the flu shot, not the nasal-spray vaccine.
- Children younger than 9 years old who get a vaccine for the first time need two doses.
- Get the seasonal flu vaccine for yourself.
- Encourage your child's close contacts to get seasonal flu vaccine, too. This is very important if your child is younger than 5 or if he or she has a chronic health problem such as asthma (breathing disease) or diabetes (high blood sugar levels). Because children under 6 months can't be vaccinated, they rely on those around them to get vaccinated.
- Wash your hands often and cover your coughs and sneezes. It's best to use a tissue and quickly throw it away. If you don't have a tissue, cough or sneeze into your upper sleeve, not your hands. This will prevent the spread of germs.
- Tell your children to:
- Stay away from people who are sick;
- Clean their hands often;
- Keep their hands away from their face, and
- Cover coughs and sneezes to protect others.

The flu comes on suddenly. Most people with the flu feel very tired and have a high fever, headache, dry cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, and sore muscles. Some people, especially children, may also have stomach problems and diarrhea. The cough can last two or more weeks.

People who have the flu usually cough, sneeze, and have a runny nose. The droplets in a cough, sneeze or runny nose contain the flu virus. Other people can get the flu by breathing in these droplets or by getting them in their nose or mouth.

Most healthy adults may be able to spread the flu from one day before getting sick to up to 5 days after getting sick. This can be longer in children and in people who don't fight disease as well (people with weaker immune systems).

Wash your children's hands with soap and water. Wash them for as long as it takes to sing the "Happy Birthday" song twice. If soap and water are not handy, use wipes or gels with alcohol in them unless they are visibly soiled. The gels should be rubbed into hands until the hands are dry.

Make sure your child gets plenty of rest and drinks lots of fluids. Talk with your child's doctor before giving your child over-the-counter medicine. If your children or teenagers may have the flu, never give them aspirin or medicine that has aspirin in it. It could cause serious problems.

No. If your child has the flu, he or she should stay home to rest. This helps avoid giving the flu to other children.

Children with the flu should be isolated in the home, away from other people. They should also stay home until they are symptom-free for 24 hours (that is, until they have no fever without the use of fever-control medicines and they feel well for 24 hours.) Remind your child to protect others by covering his or her mouth when coughing or sneezing. You may want to send your child to school with some tissues, wipes or gels with alcohol in them if the school allows gels.

From ECS the following students were chosen to participate in the Junior High Area All-State Band (pictured at right): Kourtney Robinson on flute, Katie Barry on Clarinet and Rylie Aldrich on clarinet.

This festival was held at Ak-
 ron Central School on November
$1^{\text {st }} \& 2^{\text {nd }}, 2013$. Rehearsals were all day on the $1^{\text {st }}$ with more rehearsals and the concert on the $2^{\text {nd }}$.

## School District Water Testing Results

In compliance with requirements from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) the Ellicottville Central School District has had samples of water from our distribution system collected and tested for lead and copper. The tests were conducted from five samples taken throughout the school campus. Samples from Ellicottville Central School did not exceed the action levels established by the EPA. The action level is the concentration of a contaminant, which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements, which a water system must follow.

## STAR Registration Deadline is Dec. 31

New legislation requires all homeowners receiving a Basic STAR exemption to register with the New York State Tax Department in order to receive the exemption in 2014 and subsequent years.

Registration started and will continue through
December 31, 2013.
Homeowners
 will not have to register in order to receive their 2013 STAR exemptions. Homeowners will not have to re-register every year. Based on the information provided at registration, the Tax Department will monitor homeowners' eligibility in future years.

HOW TO REGISTER: You can register for the STAR exemption online. You'll need to:

- provide a STAR code (codes were mailed to all Basic STAR recipients; or you can use the STAR code lookup)
- provide the names and social security numbers for all owners of the property and spouses
- confirm that the property is the primary residence of one of its owners (married couples with multiple residences may only claim one STAR exemption)
- confirm that the combined income of the owners and their spouses who reside at the property does not exceed $\$ 500,000$
- confirm that no resident owner received a residency-based tax benefit from another state

Seniors receiving Enhanced STAR who reside outside of New York City must continue to: apply annually, or participate in the Income Verification Program
