

Dedication Ceremony Unveils New Facilities Students, Staff & Parents Enjoy Upgrades

With the formal dedication behind us, we are now enjoying use of the new facilities! Like buying a new home or remodeling an existing one...it will take some time to get use to the new things that have been added and how the improvements change the daily operation of the school.

As we transition into the use of the new gym, it is amazing how much larger the space is and this greatly impacts the kind of activities the teachers can schedule. It is much easier to plan multiple activities with the increase in space. We have found that with several of our athletes experiencing some injuries during the fall sports season, they were able to work on rehabilitating those injuries by using the vast array of fitness equipment that we have in the new Fitness/Weight Room. This helps not only in their recovery, but allows them

to continue participating in physical education classes. The new Fitness Room is already a hit with many of our students!

During the last few weeks the sound, lighting and technology components of the new multi-purpose room are finally coming together and our staff is being trained on how they work. It is hard to imagine how different

concerts, assemblies and musical productions are going to be with these state-of-the-art "special touches" that the facility will now have. We also envision future "dances" to be held in the new gym!

The lockers have arrived!! We finally received the gym lockers and from the pictures in this newsletter you can see that they have been fully installed. The boys and girls locker areas will have a special section for varsity athletes so that while they are playing a sport they will have larger lockers available to them. The news about the student lockers is not as good...the six foot lockers arrived a foot short, so new ones have been reordered and we hope to have them installed by early December. Temporary ones have been installed for the 6th graders.

Additional protective padding has been ordered to cover the entire front of the stage so we can protect the wood portion of the stage during gym classes and athletic team practices. Additional padding will also be installed over the seating.

The display case in the front entrance to the building is still receiving some finishing touches and should be done within a couple weeks. As we have announced before, it will feature the original "bells" from the 1887 Ellicottville High School and the Great Valley High School 1894 as well as the "clock" from the old Ellicottville School. These are a lasting tribute to our history when the "merger "of the two high schools formed the Ellicottville Central School District in 1948.

At the invitation of our School Board, the West Valley Board of Education and administration took a tour of the district's new facilities. Since the West Valley students are now part of the Ellicottville interscholastic sports program we wanted them to have an opportunity to see what will be available to their students. Board members and administrators talked informally about other ways the districts could potentially share and collaborate in the future.

Three special events have already been held this year involving the West Valley students; a 7-12 pep rally for Homecoming was held at ECS, an invitation for WV students in 9-12 to attend the Homecoming Dance (over forty attended!) and a 7-12 Pep Rally honoring the Boys and Girls Regional Soccer games was held November 6th.

Changes Announced to MS/HS Physical Education Grades

This article has been written to share some important information about a change in how Physical Education grades will be handled in the middle school and high school PE classes. Starting this year we will no longer use letter grades for physical education, and, instead, will be switching to numeric grades. These numeric grades will be included in the computation of a student's overall GPA for class rank starting with the class of 2017; the current junior class. While seniors will receive numeric grades this year, they will not be used to compute their overall GPA. We have made this change because we feel it is a better representation of students' work in PE; especially those students that try their hardest in class activities. Please be assured that these grades will not be determined based on a student's pure physical ability as the attitude, effort and participation that a student puts in to his or her physical education classes will be incorporated into the grade. (This includes changing every day for physical education classes!) Should you have any questions please do not hesitate to contact one of the physical education teachers or Mr. Miller in the high school office.

APPR Hardship Waiver Approved

The District received notification from the State Education Department that its application for a Hardship Waiver has been approved. The Board of Education, Teacher's Union and Administration have been working on a new APPR plan based on Education Law 3012-d, but with the late approval of the details by the Board of Regents (June 2015) all parties involved did not want to rush into a new plan.

Collectively, we have been working on developing a better understanding of the new law and how it will impact our teachers and administrators who receive evaluation scores based on the testing results of the students. There are some rather significant changes in the law and it is important for us as a district to understand the changes as we develop a new plan.

The district will continue to operate under the 3012-c regulations, but will have to have a new plan approved on or before March 1, 2016 and implemented for 2015-16. It is possible also to receive a second and third Hardship Waiver (if a district doesn't have a final plan to submit by March 1, 2016), however, all districts must have a APPR plan consistent with the requirements of Education Law 3012-d in place by September 1, 2016.

Once the specific regulations have been released, it will make our task much easier. We do not anticipate having a problem meeting our legal requirement. Educating ourselves on the new law and the changes to the evaluation process, new HEDI scale, revised matrix, student growth score, student performance subcomponent and methodology used in obtaining the overall score are all things that we need to review and better understand.

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Health Office Reminders from Mrs. Watt

If your child has a fever of 100.0F or greater and has a cough or a sore throat, they need to be out of school for 24 hours, or until they are fever-free or symptom-free for 24 hours without fever reducing medicine. Your child may also exhibit runny nose, congestion, vomiting, diarrhea, headache, fatigue and muscle aches. Even without a fever, if your child is sick with any of the above and they are feeling unable to come to school, keep them home until they have felt well for 24 hours.

Flu season is coming ... Be sure to call your child's health care provider and schedule a flu vaccine today. Don't forget to schedule one for yourself as well!

Please remember ... That any

medications that need to be administered to your child must have a physician's order, even over the counter medications and medications your child can selfcarry. The order can be faxed to the Health Office at 699-5635. As always, the medications must be brought in to the Health Office by a parent or guardian.

Head Lice Reminder ... The peak time that children become infested with head lice is in the summer, because of sleep-away camps, slumber parties, and vacationing. However, because head lice are so small, and because symptoms of itching may not develop for weeks or even months after infestation, parents and children alike often do not even know there is a problem unless the parent inspects a child's head closely and often. This is the time of year when we start to see some cases of head lice on children in school. This is a good opportunity to begin looking carefully through your child's scalp at least once a day if you notice that your child is scratching their scalp more than usual. If you see any stage of the head louse, nits (eggs) attached to the hair shaft that are hard to remove or live lice, your child needs to be treated, and the nits removed before you send your child back to school

Regulation Girls' Softball Field Added

With the predictable expansion to three girls' softball teams, the school needed to add an additional field. Over the years the field near the playground was primarily used for modified games as well as youth softball. The field was never laid out correctly and it was very rough and uneven which posed safety issues.

As the district was putting some finishing touches on the capital project, the Board of Education decided that we should invest in providing our students with another regulation softball field that will eventually be the varsity girl's softball field. Due to the terrain, it was decided to turn the field around so the field faces the west (like the other field).

We have done a lot of site work that evened up the playing surface and 4" of loam has been placed on the infield with

a top dressing planned for the spring. The field will be slightly longer than the other field and will feature the same finished surface that the present softball field has. Some additional drainage will be installed before winter. A new regulation fence has been installed and we plan to build two new portable dugouts over the winter.

If the winter treats the new seeding well we hope to be able to use the field in the late spring!



Town of Great Valley Helping Make Concession Stand Slope Safer



The Town of Great Valley front loader is helping the maintenance staff use excess dirt/gravel from the new softball field to backfill the bank overlooking the football field. The goal is to reduce the drop off in front of the Press Box/Concession Stand and create a more gradual slope for the safety of our spectators. We plan to fill part of the area now and finish it in the spring after there is time for the dirt to settle.
