New School Year: NEW CHANGES & INITIATIVES

With the school year nearly two months old it is a good time to reflect on some of the changes and initiatives this year that will be affecting our school and students:

Race To The Top (RTTT)

This Federal program designed to help fund educational changes across the United States has created more change than most initiatives have in the past twenty years. Since the grant involved large sums of money, States were very anxious to secure the funding. The program is tied to an "investment in change," a bold commitment to educational reform. While New York State was not funded in the first round, word was received in August 2010 that New York State was awarded \$700,000,000 that would be available over the next five years. There are a variety of requirements that came along with the money, highlighted by a teacher and principal evaluation system tied to student testing performance. Other requirements included the addition of 200 more Charter Schools, building data systems that measure student growth and success and the adoption of standards and assessments designed to assure student success in college and the workplace.

Over the past three years, we have placed a heavy emphasis on data and this is exactly where we need to be as we examine student and program performance. This kind of analysis will allow us to adjust and monitor instruction and concentrate on what is working!

While our school district is only scheduled to receive \$17,000 from the RTTT funding, we believe that through professional development, implementation of the Core curriculum and a focus on students, that student performance and teacher effectiveness will continue to improve.

ECS like all other schools across the State is working on the "details" that go along with this commitment. Teachers and administration will be working on the development of a new evaluation system that will shift the focus from the teacher to the student relying heavily on evidence. At this time, we look at this as a "process" that we have to work together to get in place.

Bullying

The District will continue to place a great deal of emphasis on this troubling topic that has gained national attention. There are a number of programs and initiatives in place with others planned. Mr. Miller communicated a number of our initiatives last month in the September Newsletter and we are continuing to work on the adoption of a district program. We are also exploring the possibility of establishing a link on our website where students or parents could anonymously report incidents.

Bullying is a very real and serious act of persistent aggression that can be verbal, physical or written. It may be done by a peer or group of peers from a position of strength or power in an effort to hurt the victim. Our district is committed to educating our students on this topic so that they will have a clear understanding of what is and is not acceptable. We pledge to create a healthy climate that embraces differences while building strong relationships among students, staff and families.

Financial Outlook

With the economy still struggling to recover, the financial outlook for the District is cloudy at best. With the passing of the tax cap that limits tax levy increases to 2% and no projected increase in state aid; the revenue side of the budget does not look good. Unless the State gives the school districts some "real" funding relief from State mandates, it will be very difficult to bridge the gap without reducing expenditures. Over the past three years we have steadily reduced staff and tightened the operation to the point that there are not many options left.

Student Performance

While 2011 provided some excellent testing results for the district, it is a new year with many challenges and opportunities for our students and staff. It is not about what you did yesterday rather what are you doing today!

Our staff is working hard to incorporate new changes to the Core Curriculum so that our students will be ready to meet the changing demands that the New York State Education Department has implemented. We will continue to examine, reflect and interpret our individual and collective test results in an effort to refine instruction and improve student achievement. Continuous improvement is a goal we establish not only for our students but for our school district.

Fall Sports

As we begin to close the door on fall sports several of the varsity teams are entering playoffs while the modified and JV teams will be ending their seasons. The countless hours that our coaches spend with our students are a great tribute to their commitment to our young people. Parents are also to be congratulated for your support of your children and the many sacrifices that go into attending games, late suppers and schedules that constantly need to be rearranged!

While winning is certainly part of competing in interscholastic sports, there are many other lifetime values that make sports an important part of the schools educational mission. Athletics offer our students an opportunity to grow and develop physically, mentally and emotionally. The lessons that sports offer provide some of the most often mentioned 21st century skills that our students need today. Working for a common cause (project), teamwork, dealing with success and failure, and goal setting are just a few of the skills that come to mind.

We want to thank all of our student-athletes for their willingness to participate. Learning to juggle your schedule, maintain good attendance and keep up with your school work is all part of learning one of the most important qualities that will follow you through life ... time management!



AWESOME DAY FOR SCIENCE



On October 13th, Ms. Brierton's Earth Science and Pre-Biology classes took a field trip to the north towns to visit the Niagara Discovery Museum, Niagara Aquarium both in Niagara Falls and to the Penn Dixie Fossil Site in Hamburg, NY. Students collected various fossil specimens endemic to the region 380 million years ago including brachiopods, crinoids, horn corals and trilobites. The Earth Sci-



ence students toured the Discovery Museum and took a nature walk along the Niagara escarpment. Pre-Biology students visited the Niagara Aquarium where they were able to observe the displays and hold living marine organisms.





BOARD EXPLORING SALE OF SCHOOL PROPERTY

The Board of Education is exploring the possible future sale of school district property that we have owned since the District purchased the school site from the Murphy's in the early 1950's. The District currently owns about 154 acres which includes the school, athletic fields, all areas that are mowed and roughly 95 acres of woodland.

The former "Murphy Farm" was developed into what old timers call the "new school" in 1960. Over the years the District has had the woodlands managed and last harvested the timber in 2007. In 1983, a six acre section of the school property was sold to Win-Sum Ski Corporation so they could expand the golf course to 18 holes. Part of this land also provides the access road that leads to the SnowPine development.

The vast majority of the land is adjacent to Holiday Valley with the land forming a "bowl" that is southwest of Cindy's and Morning Star lifts. There is also a 5+ acre portion of the property that overlooks the golf course (par 3 -5th hole and tee box area and fairway approaching the 6th hole). This land is located to the east (right side) side of the road that goes up to SnowPine .

As we are faced with reductions in state aid, a tax cap limiting property taxes and rising costs for just about everything else; the Board believes it is fiscally prudent to explore the value and options we have with this property. We will keep everyone informed as we move forward.

- Tuesday, April 24th
- * Please note that accelerated 7th grade students will take the 7th grade math assessment.
- * Please note that accelerated 8th grade students will take the 8th grade math assessment.

4th and 8th Grade Science *

- Written Assessment: Monday June 4th
- Performance Assessment: Wednesday, May 23rd – Friday, June 1st (Exact days TBD)
- * Please note that accelerated 7th grade students will take the 8th grade science assessment.
- * Please note that accelerated 8th grade students will **not** take the 8th grade science assessment.

As parents, you can play an important role in helping children prepare for these tests. One way to assist with preparation is to ensure that your child / children have a good night's sleep and breakfast each morning, as these can increase attention. Additional ways to assist with preparation are to encourage your child to read the tests carefully, and to talk with them to ease any apprehension they may have.



ANIMALS ON SCHOOL GROUNDS

To help maintain safe and healthy conditions for the students, staff and visitors to the Ellicottville Central School District, it shall be a violation of district policy for any individual to bring a dog or any other animal to any athletic or extra-curricular events.

If warranted, the District may call the appropriate Animal Control Agency.

- Animals may be permitted in the schools for instructional purposes. It is the principal's responsibility to ensure that there is an appropriate educational purpose if any animal is housed in a classroom. Animals are not to be transported on school buses.
- School staff will be responsible for the proper control of animals brought to school for instructional purposes and the principal will be responsible for insuring the effective protection of children when animals are in the school.
- In addition, those individual with disabilities that require the assistance of an animal, such as a seeing eye dog, shall be exempt from the terms of this policy.
- Also, under certain cir-• cumstances, police and other emergency services may require the presence of animals in performing their duties (such as bomb or drug searches). This decision will be made on a case-by-case basis as determined by the responding agency.
- This policy will be dissemi-• nated to the community and school personnel through normal channels of communication.
- This policy will go into effect January 1, 2012.


