WORKING TOGETHER TO IMPROVE OUR SCHOOL

We are again proud to acknowledge the contributions of several community organizations that have helped to improve our school facilities and the lives of our students. Through their assistance, donations and generosity we have made several improvements outlined below.

Driveway Paving

On August 31, the Highway Departments of the Towns of Great Valley and Ellicottville combined forces to patch our driveway and smooth out some "rough spots." The guys remarked how they enjoyed working together since they do not normally get to do things like that. It is also a great example of how inter-municipal organizations can work together for the benefit of each other. Their work and equipment saved the taxpayers greatly by using town equipment rather than hiring an outside company. The District is currently researching options to repair and replace the driveways and parking lot but this will likely be a multiple-year project based on the projected cost.

AED

The Ellicottville/Great Valley Ambulance Inc. donated a portable AED (Automatic External Defibrillator) that can be used to assist in the event a medical emergency occurs that requires "shocking" the heart.

The machine will be on-site with teams during practice and at games held at the Ellicottville Village Park. Due to the lack of enough facilities soccer games and practices are regularly held at the Village Park. Having this equipment available at all times will ensure that if an emergency arises we will be able to provide immediate medical assistance.

We truly appreciate the generosity of the Ellicottville/Great Valley Ambulance Inc. for providing the school with this \$1500 machine. The ambulance service provides medical care and transport to nearly every resident of the school district and they accomplish this without tax dollars.

Thanks to the generosity of the Ellicottville Sports Boosters, Ellicottville Little League, late Michael Kerns and Sean Lowes at City Garage; \$9500 was donated toward the purchase of the new Daktronics

From the Superintendent: WE MUST DO MORE

Students indicated they loved getting fresh air, exercise, and nutrition in this different format. As a compliment to the practice side, students also participate in the related Internet games and challenges.


The students will continue to fuel up on nutrition-dense foods and work toward getting at least 60 minutes of exercise a day. Join us as we Fuel Up to Play 60!





Three Hdded to ECS' TEACHING STAFF


We are pleased to welcome three new members to our teaching staff.

Will these pictures end up in the yearbook? You'll have to wait until June to find out!



Grades 3-8 Testing SCORES HIGH IN COUNTY

We are very proud to release the results of the Math and English Language Arts (ELA) testing results based on the testing that took place in the spring of 2010. Ellicottville Central School scored first or second in 10 out of 12 grade level categories! The results are shown on pages 9-10 of this newsletter.

This is an outstanding achievement and certainly reflects positively on our students, parents and teaching staff. This data shows the % of our students achieving level 3 or 4 in the tests that were administered. The State considers these levels to reflect competency, so our students performed well compared to similar students across Cattaraugus County. We are extremely pleased with what our staff has done to prepare our students and wanted to share that information with you.

In addition to changing the testing standards, the State also plans to change some of the actual tests. This is being done in an effort to ratchet up what is expected of our students so they will be able to compete and be successful beyond completion of their high school education. If you are going to raise the expectations at the "end"

GLOBAL CONNECT REMINDER




it only stands to reason that the bar needs to be raised at each grade level and that is exactly what the State is doing.

The new Commissioner of Education established higher "cut scores" for all students across grades 3-8 which in effect raised the bar for all students. In simplistic terms, some scores that were considered acceptable last year may not be this year.


The change in scores will mean that more students will need additional help (Academic Intervention Services-AIS) to get them to the new levels. While the State has given the schools one year to prepare for this change, ECS has decided to do everything possible to help our students "now," not wanting to delay on the additional academic support they may need.












Ellicottville High School June Regents Exam Passing Percentage 2008 - 2010 Compared to New York State (NYS) for 2008 and 2009



SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES

Dear Parent/Guardian:

The district's School Health Services program supports your student's academic success by promoting health in the school setting. One way that we provide care for your student is by performing health screenings as mandated by the State of New York.

During this school year, the following screenings will be required or completed at school:

Vision

- Distance acuity for all newly entering students and students in Pre-k,
 Kindergarten, Grades 1,2,3,5,7 and 10.
- Near vision acuity, hyperopia and color perception screening for all newly entering students.

Hearing

 Hearing screening for all newly entering students and students in Kindergarten, Grades 1,3,5,7 and 10.

Scoliosis

Scoliosis (spinal curvature) screening for all students in Grades 5-9.

Health Appraisals

- A physical examination including Body Mass Index and Weight Status Category Information is required for all newly entering students and students in Pre-K, Kindergarten, Grades 2,4,7 and 10, and all students playing sports.
- Physicals are done by the School Physician's PA during the regular school day. Students who prefer to be examined by their own physician may obtain the appropriate forms from the Health Office.

Dental Certificates

 A dental certificate is requested for all newly entering students and students in Kindergarten, Grades 2, 4,7 and 10.

A letter will be sent home if there are any findings on the screenings done at school that would cause concern or need medical follow-up. Please call the school's Health Office if you have any questions or concerns.



Advisors (teachers) work very closely with approximately 10 students, from when they enter the program until graduation, to help them pursue both academic and personal quality objectives on individualized learning plans. Real World Learning is required with all students as they must have internships related to their passions. They have mentors at their internship sites that give them real world experiences around their interests. All seniors in CAEW BOCES Big Picture programs take a senior seminar course where they are required to apply to at least 3 colleges or post secondary opportunities and are accepted to one prior to graduation. This almost unattainable goal upon entering the program has come to fruition
