

# **ECS Welcomes Bob Miller & Erich Ploetz**

### Ellicottville Administration Team Gets Both a Familiar and Fresh Face!



Bob Miller Appointed Superintendent The ECS Board of Education has appointed Robert (Bob) Miller as the new District Superintendent. And, while Mr. Miller officially

assumed his duties on July 1, 2017, he is no stranger to the District. Mr. Miller started his career at ECS in July 2005 as the MS/HS Principal, and has served the school, students and community in that capacity the past 12 years. Prior to becoming a member of the ECS family, Mr. Miller spent five years as a CTE and Special Education Administrator with the Erie 2- Chautauqua – Cattaraugus BOCES.

A 1988 Portville graduate, Mr. Miller earned his teaching degree in secondary mathematics from SUNY Brockport and right after graduation he was hired as an 8th grade math teacher at Cassadaga Valley Central School. While at Cassadaga Valley, he was an assistant and JV football coach as well as the District's computer coordinator. Mr. Miller moved closer to home when he was hired as an alternative GED teacher for the Cattaraugus Allegany BOCES at the Olean Center. During this time, Mr. Miller earned his Master's Degree in Special Education from Saint Bonaventure University, served as a computer coordinator for CTE teachers, taught Adult Education computer classes, taught summer school math, and was a volunteer coach at Portville for football and wrestling. After three years of teaching GED, Mr. Miller was presented with the opportunity to become the assistant principal at the Cattaraugus Allegany BOCES at the Belmont Center while working on his administrative credentials. Mr. Miller shared that being an assistant principal while concurrently working on administrative credentials was

a rarity at the time, but he is grateful for the opportunity and has never looked back. He also shared a truly interesting fact that connected him to ECS long before he ever applied here. In the spring of 1999, while completing his administrative internship, he had the privilege of working under and learning from Mr. Edward Ahrens (retired ECS Superintendent) who was the interim principal at the Belmont Center at the time. After three years at the Belmont Center, Mr. Miller left to work for the Erie 2 – Chautauqua – Cattaraugus BOCES.

"Twelve years ago, I came to ECS not knowing what to expect. I knew the District was well regarded as an educational leader with high test scores. great students, a superior staff, and a supportive community. What I did not know was how I would be accepted or would fit in. Well, looking back, I did not have to worry. The entire ECS family was so welcoming and a pleasure to work with. As I have been transitioning into my new role in the District, I'm finding this is still true. The people here are eager to help in so many ways to ensure the success of the District. I've always said that ECS is a special place; my experiences during this transition are a true testament to this statement! # **2017–2018 Bus Routes & Rules**

#### "DON'T LOSE YOUR RIDING PRIVILEGE!"

- 1. Be on time for pick ups/drop offs.
- 2. Do not enter or leave the bus while it is in motion.
- 3. Always pass in front of the bus, never behind, when loading or unloading from the bus.
- 4. Occupy the seat assigned by the driver or monitor.
- 5. Remain seated until the bus has reached your destination.
- 6. Head or arms must not be extended from the windows.
- Students will not throw any objects from the bus.
- 8. Large objects may not be carried on the bus due to D.O.T. regulations.
- 9. The bus driver and/or the monitor are to be obeyed at all times. Riding the bus is a privilege and drivers are instructed to report students who do not obey these rules.
- 10. Drinking, eating, cursing, swearing or loud talking are prohibited.
- 11. Please refrain from driving your car or parking in the bus circle during the hours of: 7:45 am to 8:05 am and 2:45 pm to 3:05 pm.

#### ECS TRANSPORTATION PROCEDURES

One of the most important things we are charged with at school is the safety of our student body. A number of you drop off or pickup your children at school either in the morning or in the afternoon. During high volume times, the traffic in our driveways becomes a serious point of concern for us. People have been observed making U-turns, three-point turns, and turning off the driveway onto the lawn area. Some have even passed stopped school busses in the loop in front of the school.

The Board of Education has authorized the following procedures for you to follow when dropping off or picking up children at school. They are listed here for your information and use:

1. No traffic will be permitted anywhere in front of the school while buses are in the loop:

Mornings: 7:45-8:05 am Afternoons: 2:45-3:05 pm

Late Bus: 3:50-4:05 pm

**Elementary:** The preferred arrival time for students being driven to school is after 8:05 am. The preferred pick-up time is 3:05-3:10 pm.

MS/HS: The preferred arrival time for students being driven to school is 7:45 am. Students must report to the cafeteria.

- 2. When entering the school for the elementary, please enter the driveway at the north end by the playground and leave by the high school end.
- 3. When entering to go to the high school, please enter and exit the driveway at the south end near the high school.
- 4. Arrival: elementary students must be signed in and will be recorded late after 8:15 am.
- 5. Dismissal: Please come in and sign your child out in the office. Children will be waiting inside the school for you. We will not be able to call classrooms for your child if you arrive early for pick-ups.
- 6. If you MUST drop off or pick up a student during times busses are in the loop, please park in one of our lots. No one will be permitted to park in the driveway.
- 7. It is against the law to pass any school bus that is stopped and has its red lights flashing. Yield to busses in the parking lot and driveways.

Please make certain you promptly pick up your child by 4:00 pm from after school activities. Thank you so much for your cooperation!

LATE BUSES will run on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday nights at 4:00 pm September, October, November, December, April, May and June. Late buses will run on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday nights at 4:00 pm January, February and March. These buses are for students who are involved with homework club, school clubs, review classes, computer lab time, students receiving detention, and some sports teams. There will be a north run (Ellicottville-Mansfield) and a south run (Great Valley-Humphrey area) that will cover most areas of our school district.

# MS Students up for the Challenge!

At the end of the school year most teachers are taking down their displays to begin cleaning for summer. However, this year, Mrs. Weber was adding to her displays to demonstrate the challenges that her students met and accomplished during the 2016-17 school year. During the last week of school, students were creating "book spines" for the novels they had read independently over the fourth quarter. So, Mrs. Weber went to work to place these books on the bookshelves and tally up the total for the year. In September, the middle school English teacher challenged her students to see how many books they could read independently over the course of the school year. In the first quarter, the pretend bookcase was almost full. The students read so many books, she had to continue the display across the cupboards in the back of the room. The grand total was 430 books read independently. This does not include the novels students read with the class.

Another challenge given to middle school English students this past year was to reach for success. Students kept their own data tracking folders to keep track of their progress and create goals for their learning. The class also had a bulletin board at the front of the room which tracked each class periods' progress on writing assignments and tests. Each quarter was given a different shape and color to represent the changes throughout the year. If 80% of the students in the class earned 80% on an assignment, then the designated shape was placed on the board. Mrs. Weber actually finished this board after students left for the year because she was so pleased with their final results. All five middle school classes ended the year with 80% of the students earning 80% or higher on their fourth quarter average. Four of the five classes also earned 80% at 80% or higher on their final exam, and one eighth grade class, period 6, earned 90% or higher on their final exam. Congratulations students for meeting the challenge!

Letter to Parents for School Meal Programs

#### Dear Parent/Guardian:

Children need healthy meals to learn. Ellicottville Central School offers healthy meals every school day. Breakfast costs \$1.15; lunch costs K-4 \$1.95 & 5-12 \$2.10. Your children may qualify for free meals or for reduced price meals. Reduced price is \$0.25 for breakfast and \$0.25 for lunch.

- DO I NEED TO FILL OUT AN APPLICATION FOR EACH CHILD? No. Complete the application to apply for free or reduced price meals. Use
  one Free and Reduced Price School Meals Application for all students in your household. We cannot approve an application that is not complete, so be
  sure to fill out all required information. Return the completed application to: Vicky Williams, Ellicottville Central School, 716-699-2316.
- WHO CAN GET FREE MEALS? All children in households receiving benefits from SNAP, the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations or TANF, can get free meals regardless of your income. Also, your children can get free meals if your household's gross income is within the free limits on the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines.
- CAN FOSTER CHILDREN GET FREE MEALS? Yes, foster children that are under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or court, are eligible for free meals. Any foster child in the household is eligible for free meals regardless of income.
- CAN HOMELESS, RUNAWAY, AND MIGRANT CHILDREN GET FREE MEALS? Yes, children who meet the definition of homeless, runaway, or migrant qualify for free meals. If you haven't been told your children will get free meals, please call or e-mail Tina Barrett, Ellicottville Central School, 716-699-2904 to see if they qualify.
- WHO CAN GET REDUCED PRICE MEALS? Your children can get low cost meals if your household income is within the reduced price limits on the Federal Eligibility Income Chart, shown on this application.
- SHOULD I FILL OUT AN APPLICATION IF I RECEIVED A LETTER THIS SCHOOL YEAR SAYING MY CHILDREN ARE APPROVED FOR
  FREE MEALS? Please read the letter you got carefully and follow the instructions. Call the school at 716-699-2316 ext. 403 if you have questions.
- 7. MY CHILD'S APPLICATION WAS APPROVED LAST YEAR. DO I NEED TO FILL OUT ANOTHER ONE? Yes. Your child's application is only good for that school year and for the first 30 operating days of this school year. You must send in a new application unless the school told you that your child is eligible for the new school year.
- I GET WIC. CAN MY CHILD(REN) GET FREE MEALS? Children in households participating in WIC may be eligible for free or reduced price
  meals. Please fill out a FREE/REDUCED PRICE MEAL application.
- WILL THE INFORMATION I GIVE BE CHECKED? Yes and we may also ask you to send written proof.
- 10. IF I DON'T QUALIFY NOW, MAY I APPLY LATER? Yes, you may apply at any time during the school year. For example, children with a parent or guardian who becomes unemployed may become eligible for free and reduced price meals if the household income drops below the income limit.
- WHAT IF I DISAGREE WITH THE SCHOOL'S DECISION ABOUT MY APPLICATION? You should talk to school officials. You also may
  ask for a hearing by calling or writing to: SUPERINTENDENT, Robert Miller, bmiller@eville.wnyric.org, 716-699-2368.
- MAY I APPLY IF SOMEONE IN MY HOUSEHOLD IS NOT A U.S. CITIZEN? Yes. You or your child(ren) do not have to be U.S. citizens to
  qualify for free or reduced price meals.
- 13. WHO SHOULD I INCLUDE AS MEMBERS OF MY HOUSEHOLD? You must include all people living in your household, related or not (such as grandparents, other relatives, or friends) who share income and expenses. You must include yourself and all children living with you. If you live with other people who are economically independent (for example, people who you do not support, who do not share income with you or your children, and who pay a pro-rated share of expenses), do not include them.
- 14. WHAT IF MY INCOME IS NOT ALWAYS THE SAME? List the amount that you normally receive. For example, if you normally make \$1000 each month, but you missed some work last month and only made \$900, put down that you made \$1000 per month. If you normally get overtime, include it, but do not include it if you only work overtime sometimes. If you have lost a job or had your hours or wages reduced, use your current income.
- 15. WE ARE IN THE MILITARY. DO WE INCLUDE OUR HOUSING ALLOWANCE AS INCOME? If you get an off-base housing allowance, it must be included as income. However, if your housing is part of the Military Housing Privatization Initiative, do not include your housing allowance as income.

#### **Pesticide Use Notification**

During the school year, it may be necessary for maintenance staff to use pesticides on school grounds to meet pest management goals. #### Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA)

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), a Federal law, requires that the Ellicottville Central School District, with certain exceptions, obtain your written consent prior to the disclosure of personally identifiable information from your child's education records. However, the Ellicottville Central School District may disclose appropriately designated "directory information" without written consent, unless you have advised the District to the contrary in accordance with District procedures. The primary purpose of directory information is to all the Ellicottville Central School District to include this type of information from your child's education records in certain school publications.

#### **Examples may include:**

- a playbill, showing your student's role in a drama production;
- · the annual yearbook;

- honor roll or other recognition lists;
- graduation programs; and
- sports activity sheets, showing weight and height of team members.

Directory information, which is information that is generally not considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if released, can also be disclosed to outside organizations without a parent's prior written consent. Outside organizations include, but are not limited to, companies that manufacture class rings or publish yearbooks.

In addition, two federal laws require local educational agencies (LEAs) receiving assistance under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA) to provide military

In addition, two federal laws require local educational agencies (LEAs) receiving assistant under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA) to provide military recruiters, upon request, with three directory information categories - names, addresses and telephone listings - unless parents have advised the LEA that they do not want their student's information disclosed without prior written consent. (1)

If you do not want the Ellicottville Central School District to disclose directory information from your child's education records without your prior written consent, you must notify the District in writing by September 30, 2017. The Ellicottville Central School District has designated the following information as directory information:

- Students Name
- Address
- · Telephone Listing
- · Electronic mail address
- · Photograph
- · Date and place of birth
- · Major field of study
- · Dates of attendance
- Weight and height of members of athletic teams
- Degrees, honors, and awards received
- · Grade Level
- The most recent educational agency or institution attended
- Participation in officially recognized activities and sports

(1) These laws are: Section 9528 of the ESEA (20 U.s.C. 7908), as amended by the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 (P.L. 107-110), the education bill, and 10 U.S.C. 503, as amended by section 544, the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2002 (P.L. 107-107), the legislation that provides funding for the Nation's armed forces.

#### **Asbestos Containing Materials**

In compliance with Sections 763.85 and .93 of the asbestos-containing materials in schools rule, all facilities owned, leased or operated by the Ellicottville Central School District have been inspected for the presence of asbestos-containing building materials. Asbestos management plans have been developed for all facilities and submitted to the NYS Education Department. The E.P.A. requires re-inspections every five (5) years by an accredited asbestos inspector. This re-inspection was done on October 2012, and the results were reviewed by an accredited management planner. The 2012 re-inspection found no significant changes in the condition of the asbestos-containing materials. In general, the asbestos materials in the district are in good condition and will continue to be managed as recommended by the accredited management planner. Copies of the management plans are available for public inspections and management plans should be made to Kevin Blendinger, Maintenance Supervisor, at 716-699-2316 (ext. 1404).

#### **Sex Offender Registry Website**

The purpose of this site is to provide an overview of the sex offender registration law and how the public can obtain information about sex offenders. The Sex Offender Registration Act, New York's version of Megan's Law, became effective on January 21, 1996. The text of the statute is contained in Correction Law Article 6-C (Section 168 et seq.).

Registered sex offenders in New York are classified by the risk of reoffense. A court determines whether an offender is a level 1 (low risk), 2 (moderate risk) or 3 (high risk). The court also determines whether an offender should be given the designation of a sexual predator, sexually violent offender or predicate sex offender.

Level 1 and 2 sex offenders registered prior to March 11, 2002 register for 10 years while level 3 offenders register for life.
